Duce Girls Italy To Meet League Sanctions.

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"Implacable Resistance" Duce pledged "implacable resistance" to sanctions. At the same time he pushed his war in Ethiopia, sent another shipload of troops to Africa and ordered a slight reduction in food prices, effective tomorrow.

WARSAW, Oct. 31.—(C. P. Havas)—A violent argument between five Italians over the merits of the Italo-Ethiopian war today resulted in the death of three of the disputants.

The five were reported to have met in a more or less friendly argument over local issues. But their animosities were aroused when the subject changed to the war and in the fight that ensued only two were left alive.

TRIBESMEN REPULSED IN ATTACKS Bloody Battle On Southeast Front. FUTILE EFFORT (Continued from Page 1)

assailed the Italian redoubt at Wawal, word received here stated. The Fascist army brought tanks and field artillery into play in its drive on the tribesmen, it was learned.

REPORTS OF THE REVERSES SUFFERED IN the southeast cast a pall of gloom over this Capital tonight. Military observers were of the opinion Ethiopian tactics had been forced to give way to the impetuosity of their long-idle warriors, who on the 29th day of the war were unable to endure the seeming lethargy of their leaders any longer.

ADDIS ABABA, Oct. 31.—(A.P.)—Ethiopian military circles disclosed today unofficial and wholly unsubstantiated reports of a fierce and bloody battle yesterday near Makale.

REPORTS SAID DANAKIL NOMADS had fallen on an Italian supply column under cover of darkness and had slain 15 Fascist guards. Twenty-five camels were reported captured.

BATTLE BETWEEN THE huge Ethiopian army commanded by Crown Prince Asfaw Wassan Tafari and the Fascist invaders was expected soon. The Crown Prince is entrenched around Dessie, about half way between Addis Ababa and Mussa Ali.

TOWNS TAKEN ADIGRAT, Ethiopia, Oct. 31.—Trained native troops beating a trail for the main advance of the Italian column occupied another village today and seized wells to supply the blackbirds with water.

THE NATIVE TROOPS OF THE northern forces have developed tactically as the Haigley highway to strategic Makale and have taken the natural fortress of Amba Sion, 30 miles from that objective.

QUAKE ROCKS SOUTHERN ALBERTA
