THERE were 31 passengers and 89 bags of mail by the Stanley to Georgetown Saturday morning. The cargo included 6 cars hay, one car timber, 3 cars of way freight.

But to his surprise his fiancée did not arrive on the Parisian. He cabled to England for an explanation, but no answer came, and fearing the young lady was ill he packed his trunks last evening and left for England on the Corinthian to learn the cause of the lady's failure to meet him.

THE death occurred at Millinocket, Me., on Jan. 7th of Jennie A. McEwen at the age of 22 years, youngest daughter of Joseph and Mrs. McEwen of Millinocket, Maine, formerly of Charlottetown, P. E. I. Jennie had a wide circle of friends both in Millinocket and Bangor Falls where she formerly lived, and in many other places where she was known. She was of an agreeable disposition and had the faculty of making many friends where she went. Prayers were said at the house Tuesday afternoon at one o'clock, and at two o'clock funeral services were held in the Congregational church. Rev. W. J. McNeil officiated assisted by Rev. C. E. Young. The Royal Neighbors of which organization she was a member acted as escort. The church was filled with mourning friends. The floral offerings from the young friends and people of her acquaintance, the out of town friends, the business men and clerks of the town and others were very beautiful. During the afternoon the store where she had been employed was closed. The bearers were C. L. Harmon, William Haddock, Frank Bradley and Lawrence Brewer. Interment was in Riverside Cemetery. Of the immediate family who remain and to whom much sympathy is extended are the parents Joseph and Mrs. McEwen and son Brenton, all of Millinocket, two sisters Mrs. B. J. Carlisle of East Hampden and Mrs. James Williams of South Brewer, Maine.

ROCKEFELLER HIT HARD BY PRIEST

The Head of the Standard Oil Company is Bitterly Attacked by Father Ducey of New York.

NEW YORK, Jan. 15. Referring to John D. Rockefeller as "Mr. Oilrefeller," the Rev. Thomas J. Ducey preached against trusts and monopolies in general, and the Standard Oil Company in particular, at the last mass in his church today.

"In this country," said Mr. Ducey, "exists a monopoly and trust that threatens the safety of the government, truth, justice, the freedom of education and purity of soul in religious profession. This monopoly has led in the struggle against legislation to regulate commerce. Its power in the press, the pulpit and in colleges is recognized. This paramount trust of the world is well preserved in oil and gold, and is glossed over by universities and upheld openly by a denomination and criminally approved by the silence which grants consent of the ministers of religion of many denominations.

"From the time that Mr. 'Oilrefeller' began crowding the weaker and the more honorable remorselessly to the wall by means of improvement companies, which meant to destroy opponents and improve himself, but one purpose marked his misdoings. It would be well for those who are in the habit of quoting the Bible in public to remember that the devil can quote Scripture to his purpose, and can steal the livery of heaven to do work of sin, crime and injustice.

"His history brings out the prime source of his wealth, by playing on the supidity of railroads, and compelling them to give secret and unlawful rebates. This lawless power grew by what it fed upon. His history is a shocking tale, incredible were it not verified by sworn testimony of railroad managers, who stooped to perjury to get business.

"With each advance toward monopoly he became more grasping and used his power more unscrupulously to crush the weak, and that by the most abhorrent means. No enemy forceful enough and conscienceless enough need despair of being taken into his employ. The evidence presented proves that robber trusts and monopolies are crimes and criminals against God's bounty, the interests of man, the evidences of religion and the liberty of education."
