MISS ALICE BEERS and Miss M. King were passengers by the steamer Halifax on Sunday evening from Boston. Miss Beer and Miss King will remain in Halifax for a few days, after which they return to their homes in Charlottetown, P. E. I.—Halifax Chronicle.

COMPLAINTS were made to the city officials this morning regarding the exhibition of the man hypnotised in Prowse Brothers and Crowell's window. The chief-of-police asked Professor McEwen to awake or remove the man. This professor refused to do, claiming that he was acting in accord with the law. The chief threatened to have the professor's license revoked, but it had no effect on the hypnotist.—Sydney Record.

DALHOUSIE College, Halifax, has recently issued its calendar for the coming year's work. It offers to students many inducements. For those entering the first year arts and science, it provides the McKenzie Bursary of \$20., the Professor's Scholarship exempting from all fees of the entire course in art and science. Two Sir Wm. Young Scholarships, one of \$100. A second of \$75. To students matriculating into the second year, who have not attended classes of first year, it offers a Professor's Scholarship with exemption from fees throughout the college course. We commend this to the attention of our Island students, and refer them to the College Calendar for fuller information.

EASTERN NOTES.—Farmers are completing the bulk of their spring work, though many odds and ends, inseparable from the modern system, remain still to be done.—Fishing is rather dull at present, fish and bait both being scarce. The first mackerel of the season have been netted. The pioneers of that body which is now approaching the Gulf in greater or less quantities and which is harassed in its annual migrations towards us on the Nova Scotia shore by that destructive invention the purse seine. Lobstering looks a little better here at present and it appears as if an average catch may be made.—Lakeville and Red Point cheese factories are both open the former manufacturing butter; the quantity of milk coming in is yet comparatively small. Considerable sickness prevails here at present and we have to record two sudden deaths, Mrs. Angus A. McDonald, Prospect Hill and Mrs. Frank McKinnon, South Lake. 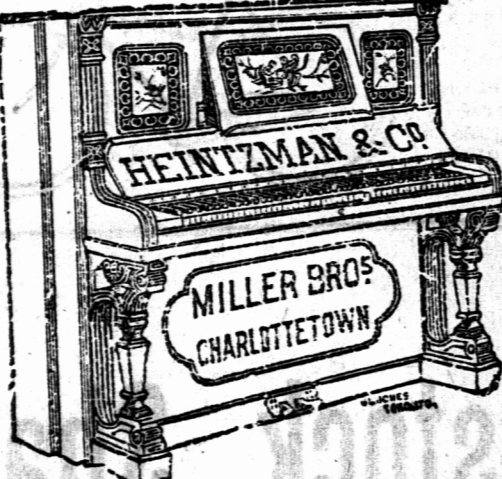

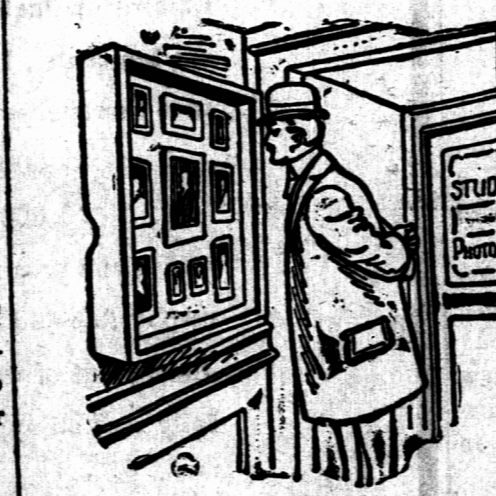
