President Schurman, of Cornell, a native of P. E. Island, in an address before the American Bankers' Association on the banking system of the country, recently, said: "I have long been a disciple and advocate of the doctrine that the United States has the worst system of banking and currency in the whole civilized world. It is impossible to estimate and difficult to exaggerate the magnitude of the losses which this country has suffered from the defects of its present banking and currency system. No other civilized country would so long have endured such a waste of its resources; no other country is rich enough to have stood it."

Sheen, of Boston, a bright Prince Edward Island man, who for several years has been manager of the Dunlap Cooke company's branch at Boston, has, since the death of Mr. Cooke, been appointed general manager of the company, with headquarters at Boston, and with branches also in Halifax and St. John. The progress of the "pro" hockey league in the sister provinces is being watched with interest here. On Friday night the New Glasgow team from the Halifax Crescents by a score of 7-4, after leading in each period of play. In Halifax on that date Moncton defeated the Socials by a score of 5-2. The scarcity of first-class creamery butter, says an exchange, has been responsible for a three cent annex to last week's figures and creamery solids are better by 2c. Other butters are fairly easy at last week's prices. The quiet market reported from Montreal last week has developed into an easier feeling. No orders have been received for car lots for the Northwest and Coast. Local trade is also quiet. Local dealers and retailers replenished their stock strongly before the holidays. Receipts continue to keep ahead of those of last year, but stocks are much lighter than at this time in 1911, and there is no doubt that this stock will be badly needed before the new make—a period of about four months ahead. The big shortage in the English and Canadian make of cheese has made itself felt in the high range of prices on both sides of the Atlantic, which eclipse anything before felt in Canada. Values have been on the mend since November, and to-day 15c. is readily obtainable for finest Western Septembers.

Rev. A. F. Newcombe, travelling secretary of the Canadian Bible Society for the maritime province and Newfoundland, with headquarters here, returned yesterday from Halifax. He has completed a trip covering 1,500 miles in the three provinces and has addressed seventeen meetings. In Halifax he and Rev. W. B. Cooper, general secretary for Canada, attended the annual meeting of the branch of the Canadian Bible Society there.—Exc. (Rev. Mr. Newcombe is well known here.)

At a recent meeting of the St. John Liquor License Commissioners Rev. H. E. Thomas, formerly of this city, was a speaker. Rev. Mr. Thomas spoke informally of the objection of the temperance people to allowing hotels to have the view of their bars obscured from the street and intimates that another test case might be brought to prove the law required the view from the street to be unobstructed. He spoke of blinds being drawn in some saloons and of the practice of obstructing the window with an office, so-called.

There is now in progress on the Arena Alleys a bowling league in which five teams are rolling off a series of games in duckpins. The team winning out will be presented with five medals and the highest individual scorer will receive a handsome silver trophy. At the present stage the Mechanics are in the lead. Some good scores and averages have been made and of these the highest individual score in a game has been A. Lafferty, 121 with H. S. McLeod second with 117.
