RED ARMY CLOSING AROUND POLISH CAPITAL

Now Within 20 Miles of City and Likely to Get in Before Peace Negotiations are Concluded.

(Special to The Guardian.) PARIS, August 14.—Closing upon Warsaw from the north, east and southeast, the Bolshevik hosts are now within twenty miles of the capital and little doubt is felt here that they will be in the city before the peace negotiations are concluded.

REDS CAPTURE MLAWA.

WARSAW, August 14.—Mlawa an important city on the Warsaw-Danzig railroad, about fifty miles north west of this city, has been taken by the Russian Bolsheviks, according to reports in military circles here last night.

Advancing All Along the Line.

The northern Reds, according to the latest news reaching Paris to night had passed Pulusk and were marching southward on the Capital down the Valley of the Narew. Another column was advancing between the Narew and the Bug while south of the Bug the enemy had reached and passed through Pilyki, Douza, Kaluszyn, Tsegloff and Latorch to Zehoff.

POLISH SUCCESSES.

WARSAW, August 14.—Polish successes on the southern front, where the Russians have been pushing forward from Lemberg, were reported in last night's official communications. The Polish cavalry and infantry have ousted the Bolsheviks from Radzioloff, Popatyr, Stanystawek and Toporoff. These towns are in the district northwest of Lemberg and to the west and northwest of Brody on the old Galician border.

Russians And Germans Convene

BERLIN, Aug. 14.—Wilber Kopp, the Soviet emissary to Germany, arrived here yesterday from Moscow, carrying it is said, important despatches and instructions bearing upon and going far at shape new relations between Soviet-Russia and Germany. Soon after his arrival he called at the Foreign Office and held a long conference with Baron Von Maltzahn, chief of the Russian department, and regarded as one of the cleverest diplomats in the German service.

PARIS, August 14.—Backed by France, General Wrangel has started an extensive drive on the Crimean front to draw Red troops away from Poland, according to unofficial advices received here today. Wrangel was reported to have defeated the thirteenth Bolshevik army taking 4,000 prisoners and capturing under his orders boarded Vitchoff in an attempt to open the Dnieper River.

HALIFAX, N.S., August 13.—After a run of five days nine hours and forty minutes from Liverpool via Queenstown, the Cunard liner Caronia arrived in port late this afternoon and docked tonight. She landed 500 passengers and 500 tons of mail. The steamer had good weather until off the Newfoundland coast, when she encountered heavy fog. She covered 2,252 miles at an average speed of 17.36 knots an hour.

Island Lady Instantly Killed

It is with deep regret that the Guardian records the sad death of Miss Louise Shaw which occurred at Brantford, New York, on Aug. 4th, the result of an accident. Miss Shaw was on her way to P. E. Island to visit her mother in West River and had gone down to say good bye to some friends just before train time and was taking a short cut to the station when she was struck by a train and instantly killed. Miss Shaw was completely deaf, did not hear the express coming and was walking along to track when the front of the engine struck her side and she only lived a few minutes, and never regained consciousness. Upon receipt of a telegram announcing her sister's death, Mr. Walter B. Shaw of the United Farmers Guide of Moncton, left for the scene of the accident, joining his sister Mrs. Horton at Portsmouth, N. H. The remains were taken to Boston and laid to rest in the beautiful Auburn cemetery on August 8th beside her aunt Louise. The late Miss Shaw, who was 44 years of age, was a woman of many charming qualities, and had endeared herself to many friends during her fifteen years residence in New York and they with her relatives and friends in this province extend deepest sympathy to her bereaved mother, three sisters and two brothers who survive.

PLOT TO OVERTHROW BRITISH GOVERNMENT

And Assassinate King George is One of the I. Stories Coming from Germany.

It stated that the correspondent, in touch with the Moscow Government, was informed the chief aim of the Bolsheviks was to strike a death blow to the British Government. In furtherance of this, two special commissions had been formed in Moscow. The first was reported to be subsidizing Sinn Feiners with large sums, according to this story, working in co-operation with an Irish assassin named King George. The second commission, the Lockenzetter editorially added that it considered the story fantastic.
