EMPEROR OF TAHARA.

ROME, Jan. 16.—(Special)—Madame Lebouy, mother of the Paris millionaire Jacques Lebouy who styles himself "Jacques the First, Emperor of Sahara," has arrived here, bringing \$2,000 to the Pope as Peter's pence.

WANTS POPE'S RECOGNITION.

He will ask the Vatican to institute an apostolic prefecture for his territory. Jacques also to appoint a diplomatic representative to the Vatican.

THE RAILWAY EXTENSION.

SIR:—I notice in the report of the Ward Five meeting and also the Labor Union meeting Mr. Paton is quoted as saying it would be a long time before the railway would be extended along the water front. The Board of Trade and the City Council passed strong resolutions in favor of the Great George street site and the extension of the railway to our wharves and Mr. Paton supported these resolutions. Now Sir the public I am sure would like to have Mr. Paton's reasons for the statement made by him whether the Board of Trade or the City Council have received any communication from the Railway Department that would justify Mr. Paton's remarks. Has he had private advice to that effect or is it only a bid for the truckman's votes? I would ask Mr. Paton to explain what position the truckmen would be in provided the station is built at the foot of Hillsboro street and the proposed new Railway wharf is placed in connection with the present railway property. Would not all freight for export by rail be shipped at this wharf direct from the cars and freight imported for delivery along the line of Railway would it not also come to the same wharf? If our wharves and water front property is not protected the city will lose the revenue derived from that source and other property will be called on to make good the loss.

WAR SITUATION IS UNCHANGED

Japan is Dissatisfied With the Russian Note

Russia will not Discuss Manchuria—Japan Insists on Open Door—Other Powers May be Involved.

THE SITUATION UNCHANGED.

LONDON, Jan. 16.—(Special)—There is practically no change in the eastern situation which is summed up as follows:

JAPAN AND RUSSIA.

Japan is dissatisfied with the Russian

note, while Russia has conceded all she can, except possibly small concessions in Korea.

She refuses to discuss the question of Manchuria.

JAPAN INSISTS; RUSSIA REFUSES.

Japan insists on pushing the Manchurian open door question and urging that she have assurance of the integrity of Korea and China, to which Russia's consent is impossible.

Russia's reply is expected to be similar to her last note.

OTHER POWERS TO BE DRAWN IN.

The feeling grows that if war comes different powers will be drawn in.

THE AMERICAN GUARD.

The American guard at the Embassy in Seoul is increased and troops now guard all the foreign residences in numbers sufficient to prevent trouble.

CHURCHES OF CHICAGO CLOSED

Fifteen are now Under Police Guard

For Violation of the Building Ordinance—Lodging Houses and College Treated in and Like Manner.

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—Fifteen churches were closed today for violations of the buildings ordinances, and Building Commissioner Williams placed them all under a guard of police until alterations are made.

In addition to closing the churches, policemen were sent to guard a number of lodging houses and the building in which a prominent commercial college is situated was closed.

Arrangements were made today by Mayor Harrison and the proprietors of the Iriquois theatre by which the building is to be used for the purpose of testing automatic sprinklers, fire extinguishers and kindred appliances before it is reconstructed.

There will be no large fire permitted in the building, only sufficient heat being provided to test the fusible caps on sprinklers. Tests of theatrical curtains will also be made and the efficiency of all appliances required by the city ordinances will be demonstrated.

CHICAGO, Jan. 14.—From action taken tonight by the city council, it is evident that the theatres in this city will not be able to reopen their doors for some time. The meeting of the council was for the purpose of considering the revision of the building ordinances and it was generally expected that the proposed amendments would be considered and adopted, that the proprietors of the theatres would know what would be demanded of them, and would be able to commence their alterations at once.
