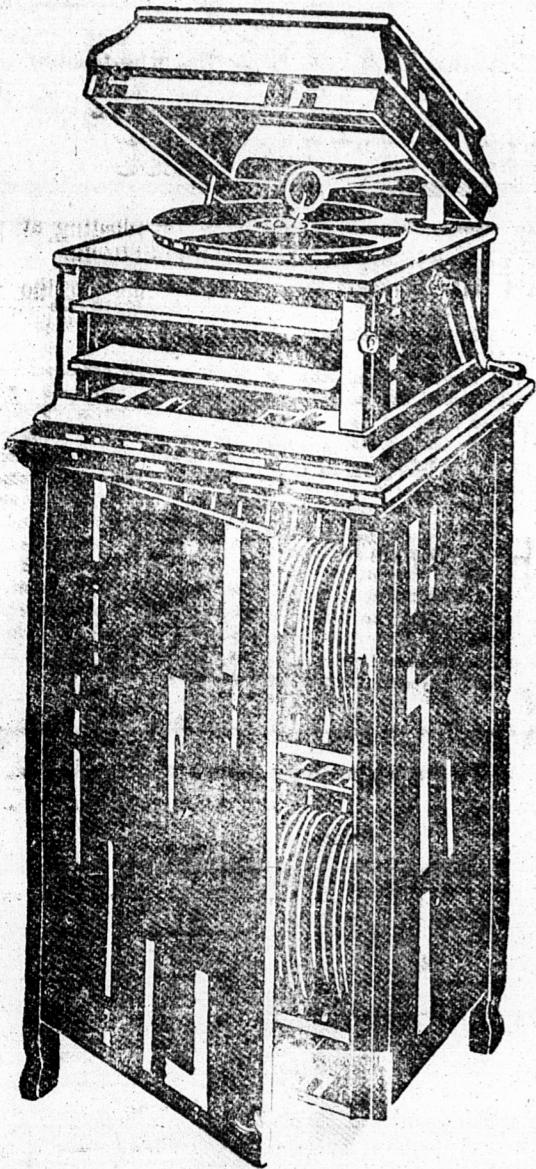

NEW MANAGER OF FALCONWOOD FARM.—Lieut. D. A. MacDonald, Wheatley River, has been appointed manager, and has assumed duty, at Falconwood Farm in succession to Mr. L. L. Jenkins, resigned. Mr. MacDonald has been driver in France having crossed first as a gunner with the first battery leaving here, and again as Lieutenant in charge of the 28th Railway Construction Draft.

OIL STEAMER SAILS.—The first steamer to arrive in port this year was the Impeco, Captain Clark. She arrived Saturday from Halifax, bringing a cargo of 4000 barrels, kerosene and 3000 of gasoline for the Imperial Oil Company. The steamer has just come from England after a rough passage of 18 days from Liverpool, to Halifax. The steamer sailed at 2.30 p.m. yesterday for Montreal. During the war this steamer was engaged in carrying aviation spirits.

BOAT BUILDER DEAD.—The death of Mr. James Griffin, recorded yesterday removes a well-known citizen. Mr. Griffin was a carpenter and boat builder. A few years ago he built the yachts Freda and Dreadnought, which took first place in the regattas in this harbor. There are left to cherish his memory, the following sisters: Mrs. George Probst; Mrs. John Corrigan; Mrs. William Flynn, and Mary, all of this city.

SERGEANT MCKAY RETURNS.—Among the soldiers being welcomed home by his wide circle of friends is Sergt. Charles McKay, Prince Street, who arrived here from St. John, unexpectedly on Friday evening. Sergt. McKay, who sailed for England with the Edmonton Battalion in 1916 and later crossed to France attached to the Canadian Railway Troops, has seen much active service and fortunately came through safely. Sergt. McKay was due home some weeks ago but took ill in England where he was in the hospital for eight weeks. He came back on the Belgic and is looking exceptionally well and delighted to be home with his wife and little son who was but a few days old when he sailed for England.

THE BAPTIST CHURCH.—It was said that the Easter music at the Baptist Church this year was the finest ever heard in that church. The large congregations who attended the service all speak in the highest praise of the work of the choir. Last Sunday this music was repeated before large congregations. H. Mann's very elaborate setting of the Magnificat in A Flat were rendered in a manner which gave ample testimony to the ability of the present Baptist Choir. The soloists of the day were Mrs. Freeman and Mr. R. Quigley, in the morning and Miss B. Boyer and Mrs. H. S. Henderson in the evening. Pro. Tanton organist and choirmaster is to be congratulated upon the splendid manner in which the musical portion of the service was carried out. Rev. Mr. Freeman preached powerful sermons at both services.
