The special train for the hockey matches in Charlottetown leaves here at 3.45 this afternoon.

The temperature yesterday morning reached the lowest point this season. The official figure registered at the Meteorological station here was 11 below zero, while most of the less reliable thermometers went as low as 16 and 17 degrees below.

The large Newfoundland dog owned by E. H. Wright was found dead Sunday morning having been poisoned by some unknown party. This dog was the largest and best animal of the breed in the town and probably in the Province and was valued very highly by the owner.

JOSEPH GILLES of Grand River, L. 14, died suddenly on Sunday morning of apoplexy. While getting ready to go to church he was seized suddenly and expired in a few minutes. He was upwards of fifty years of age and unmarried. A sister and nephew resided with him. The funeral takes place this morning.

OWING to the change of dates for the hockey matches it has been decided to hold the Grand Carnival in Crystal Rink on Monday evening, Feb. 9. The new features will be the liberal prizes offered for the best and second best costumes for both ladies and gentlemen and the introduction of the Grand Opening March, rehearsal and practice for which will be held on Friday afternoon of which notice will be given to those taking part.

The Stanley remains fast in the ice off St. Cow Head. The change in the weather on Saturday, the wind then having worked into the southeast, gave hope of an easterly or northeasterly wind, but Saturday night found the wind back again to the westward, where it remained with the coldest weather of the season. It is probable that it may take more than a northeast gale to release the steamer from her present position as the Strait is piled full of ice.

SUNDAY night and yesterday were the coldest of the season. The thermometer readings as given by the meteorological department were as follows:

- Sunday noon 26 above zero.
 - 4 p. m. 13 above zero.
 - 9 p. m. 3 above zero.
 - Coldest during the night 10.5 below zero.
 - at 9 a. m. yesterday 9.5 below zero.
- In the outlying districts it registered as low as 12 and 15 below zero.
