The death occurred on 2nd July at Mount Hope, Dundas, of Alexander McLeod, in the 72nd year of his age. He began forty nine years ago to make a home in the forest, and by perseverance he lived to have one of the most productive farms in that fine farming settlement. Although he was a busy and industrious man in his younger years, he gave of his time and means to forward the Presbyterian church at Dundas, of which he was afterwards a member. His hospitable home was always open to receive the stranger or traveller, who was always warmly and felt cheerfully. He held decided opinions on all questions of importance—but obtruded them on none. His illness which was of five or six years duration suited him for active work for the greater part of the last three years; during much of this time his Bible was his constant companion. He leaves a widow, three sons and five daughters to mourn. He lived—and died—universally respected which was evidenced by the large procession which followed the remains to their last resting place at Dundas where all that was mortal of a true friend and good neighbor was laid to rest beside a loving daughter, Christy, who predeceased him only a few weeks. An impressive funeral service at the house was conducted by his pastor Rev. M. N. McLeod, assisted at the grave by Rev. F. A. McPhee. The pallbearers were Messrs Jacob Dockendorff, Alex. McDonald, George Robertson, George Arthur, Wm. McPhee and Alfred Pope.
