Cross-Bred Steers

ARE CHOICEST BEEF

Choice baby beef, that later becomes tender juicy steaks, may be produced on any Wisconsin dairy farms nearly as efficiently as on the beef-cattle farms of the corn belt, experiments at the State University demonstrate.

Dairy cows of the Holstein breed, bred to Aberdeen-Angus beef sires, is the combination responsible for the high-quality beef.

Display Beef Type

The cross bred calves are nearly the image of their sires—black in color, polled or without horns, compact and blocky, displaying the much-desired beef type. Because of their striking resemblance to the solid black Angus sires and the complete absence of the dairy characteristics of their black and white dams, the calves have been named "occurets."

For the first six months the calves are nursed, after which they receive a full grain feed for about eight months. They are ready for market at about 18 months of age, at which time they command a premium because of their type and finish.

Where Labor is Scarce.

"This plan of breeding is particularly suited for farms where there is a shortage of labor," said J. G. Fuller, university animal husbandman, in charge of the experiments. "Part of the herd can be milked in the usual manner, and a few cows used to nurse the calves. A Holstein cow producing 6,000 pounds of milk annually will have no trouble in feeding two or three beef calves which should develop into high-class baby beef."

bulletins. That was on the Thursday before Christmas. They used it again today saying that the king had passed a good night. This was followed by a report of general improvement in his condition, and the beneficial effects of the new treatment.

The bulletins gave the nation renewed cause for thanksgiving and opened the year with new hopefulness. The four physicians who signed tonight's bulletin were in consultation for nearly two hours. The Prince of Wales who had attended one consultation during the day, returned to the hospital, and he left the palace soon after eight o'clock.

Ray therapy was omitted today and neither of the ray specialists left the palace. All of the physicians left immediately after the bulletin had been posted except Sir Stanley Hewitt.

Queen Mary took her customary drive this afternoon. Prof. Dodds, the chemical pathologist is the eleventh doctor to be called into consultation on the king's illness.

IMPROVEMENT CONTINUES

LONDON, Jan. 2.—With medical announcement tonight that King George had passed another good day and that the improvement noticed yesterday had continued, the atmosphere around Buckingham Palace was one of assurance that the danger line had at last been left behind and that although complete recovery might take a long time, it was practically assured.

This feeling was a reflection of an opinion expressed earlier by Sir William Joynton-Hicks, home secretary, who said that after a consultation with the king's doctors, he felt it would be safe to go to the south of France for a holiday. "I feel that the worst of the illness is over," said Sir William.

Tonight's bulletin was one sentence. It said: "The king passed a good day and there is a slight improvement in His Majesty's condition." The fact that this was signed by only three regular physicians—Dodds, Hewitt, Dawson and Ray—was also an encouraging factor. It was expected that should the progress of the patient continue for a few more days, the plan of issuing only one bulletin in each 24 hours would be resumed.

The doctors themselves gave evidence, beyond their bulletin, in the satisfactory condition of their patient by omitting for the first time today their regular afternoon visit to the royal sick chamber. It was understood that the calcium treatment, first mentioned in the New Year's night announcement was continued today.

WORST IS OVER

LONDON, Jan. 2.—Sir William Joynton-Hicks, Home Secretary, said today that he believed the worst is over for King George. He expressed the opinion on leaving for the Riviera where he feels free to go after a talk with the King's doctors about His Majesty's condition.

"I feel that the worst of the King's illness is over," said the Home Secretary, "and there is every reason to hope for slow but gradual improvement to take place."

The Home Secretary is going to spend his holidays near Mentone. He expects to be gone about a fortnight.

"I shall keep in very close touch with the home office while I am away," he said. "I am glad to say that the King has taken a turn for the better." Joynton-Hicks said "He is slowly pulling through." Joynton-Hicks said Lord Dawson of Penn had assured him the King's doctors were satisfied with his progress.

Ray therapy was omitted today and neither of the ray specialists left the palace. All of the physicians left immediately after the bulletin had been posted except Sir Stanley Hewitt.

Queen Mary took her customary drive this afternoon. Prof. Dodds, the chemical pathologist is the eleventh doctor to be called into consultation on the king's illness.
