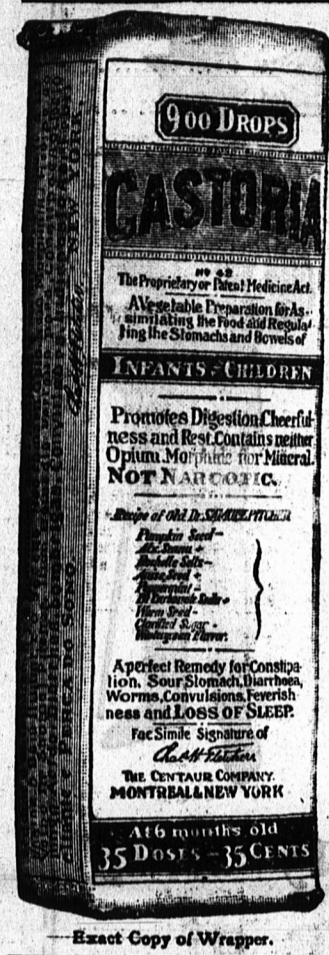

IN MEMORIAM
 JOHN ROSS
 In the death of Mr. John Ross, which occurred yesterday morning after an illness of some months, Charlottetown has lost a good citizen and his family, a kind and loving husband and father. The late Mr. Ross was born in Valleyfield 58 years ago and was for thirty years, till stricken by illness last March, employed as head cutter in the tailoring establishment of Mr. D. A. Bruce. He was for many years a member of, and an active worker in St. James' Church where, as well as in the community, he will be greatly missed. He leaves to mourn his widow, two daughters, the Misses Edna and Helen at home and one son, Fred, of the Bank of Nova Scotia staff, also one sister, Mrs. McPherson, Grand View, and three brothers, Donald, Millerfield, John and Lauchlin in Belfast. The funeral will take place tomorrow, Tuesday, leaving the home at 2 p. m. for the People's Cemetery.

MR. FRANCIS POIRIER.
 The Angel of Death has reaped another victim when Francis Poirier, of Mont Carmel, yielded his last breath on July 22 between the hours of four and five in the afternoon at the age of 27 years, after a short illness of two weeks. The deceased suffered patiently all through his illness, always resting in his Maker. He died from the sting of the malignant disease typhoid fever. He belonged to the societies of Temperance and Holy Family. He was an exemplary husband, and a good and kind neighbor. He leaves to mourn, a wife, formerly Miss Zelic Arsenault, of Adamsville, to whom he had been married only eight months. Besides his wife he leaves his father and mother, one sister in the congregation of nuns at Rogersville, and two brothers: Belloni, of the 105th Battalion, now in Europe, and Theodore in Mont Carmel all of whom are offered the heartfelt sympathies of friends and relatives. The funeral took place on Sunday, the 23rd at half past six in the afternoon, accompanied by a large number of grief-stricken friends and relatives. RUSSIANS MAKE FURTHER PROGRESS
 PETROGRAD, Aug. 5.—An official statement from headquarters issued today reads: on the Stokhod desperate fighting is proceeding near the villages of Dubesscheve and Gulevitche. During the fighting on the River Sereth near Gorodisch, about four miles above Tarnopol, Gallant Regimental Commander Col. Goronoff was wounded. In the Vorobievka Region the flow over our encampments. During the fighting south of the Dniester in the direction of Stanislas Regimental Chaplain Castorski was wounded. On the Caucasus Front, in the direction of Dzerzhik near Ogmit, between much and Mamakhatum, we captured Turkish works by an impetuous bayonet charge and took prisoner seven officers and about 300 Turkish regulars. A whole company of the latter surrendered. We also captured a gun and three machine guns, we continue to attack and prisoners are still flowing in.

MOOSEPATH HORSE RACES
 ST. JOHN, Aug. 4.—Moosepath harness meeting today drew a good attendance and the events were of particular interest. In the 2.25 trot and pace, Little Smoke, the Halifax horse, had things mostly his own way, and captured the event in straight heats with the fastest time, 2.24 1-2. Cochato Lady, with three seconds, won the second money. The other horse to start was Victoria.

There were three starters in the 2.28 class trot and pace, and this event was the best of the day. It took four heats before Major Wellington, owned by P. A. Belliveau, of Montserrat, won. The Major came under the wire in third position in the first heat, which was won by Dewell Belle, and although the Montserrat horse won the three heats and race it was no cinch as he was a hard fought battle to the wire in every heat. The best time was 2.21 1-2, in the third heat.
