


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Island Horses Taking Part In Halifax Meet



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Gordon Kuhn To Coach Moncton

MONCTON, N.B., Feb. 24 (CP)—Gordon (Doggie) Kuhn, whose Dartmouth Arrows were eliminated from the Maritime Senior Hockey League playoffs last night by Moncton Hawks, took over today as coach of the Moncton team.

Kuhn, American Hockey League star of a decade ago, will be at the helm tomorrow night when his new charges meet Halifax St. Mary's in the first game of the league finals.

Appointment of Arrows mentor is unprecedented in Maritime senior hockey and marks the first time the coach of a defeated team has succeeded his counterpart on the winning club.

Kuhn succeeds Harold (Dud) James, who took over Hawks a month ago when Les Ramsay of Verdun, Que., resigned and piloted them to the league finals. James, manager of the city-owned Moncton Stadium, was loaned to the hockey club by the city.

James said tonight pressure of his Stadium manager's duties and tipped by hockey playoffs made it necessary for him to relinquish the coaching job.

Solly Cantor To Challenge King

LONDON, Feb. 24 — Toronto's Solly Cantor is planning to challenge Lili Arthur King, Canadian and British Empire lightweight champion, for his title.

Sammy Burns of London, acting as deputy for Cantor's manager Bill Daly, now in the United States, today said boxing promoter Jack Solomon would like to stage the fight in London—if King and the British Boxing Board of Control agree.

"Cantor's made a name for himself in England and I think he deserves a title bout with King," said Burns. "I shall get in touch with King immediately."

Since coming to Britain last November, Cantor has beaten Billy Thompson, British lightweight champion, and Tommy McGovern and Peter Fallon, two outstanding British prospects.
