The emperor concluded: "I am certain that our submarines will never rest until the enemy is subdued. But for this we need as well as the power of man, the aid of God."

BORDEN SPEAKS

Continued from Page One with very difficult and complex question arising out of the war. The world-wide conditions created by the war permeate and affect this country and questions of purely domestic concern arising out of the war are constantly before us. We are continually called upon to deal with matters profoundly affecting international relations which ought to have most careful thought and most attentive consideration before they are decided. In the midst of all this a general election has been precipitated.

Responsibility for Election. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has not stated accurately or fairly, the responsibility for an election at this juncture. I proposed to him in the first instance, that coalition government should be formed with equal representation from both political parties outside of the office of Prime Minister. That proposal involved his acceptance of the principle of Compulsory Military Service. He raised the point that in the Province of Quebec such a law would not be respected or obeyed unless there was either a referendum or a general election. Quantity of material for a Union Government I endeavored to meet his objection. I therefore proposed that coalition should be formed; that the Military Service Bill should be passed, that it should not be enforced until after a general election, and that Parliament should be dissolved. Then after the general election the Military Service Act should be immediately enforced. My original proposal did not involve, but distinctly negated, the holding of a general election until after the war.

My second proposal was put forward as a means of inducing him to unite in forming a national government. It will be remembered that in the autumn of 1915 I urged him to enter into an agreement which would avoid a general election until after the war. At that time, as afterwards in 1917, he declined the proposal. In the face of his opposition, further extension of Parliament could not be pressed. This is a fair and accurate summary of the facts which made this election necessary.

The Canadian Northern Deal. Sir Wilfrid Laurier has attacked the proposal respecting the Canadian Northern Railway, and I shall deal very briefly with his objection. In the first place he is primarily responsible for the policy and for the conditions which made action inevitable if that railway and the Grand Trunk Pacific are to be maintained as important systems of transportation and not allowed to lapse into the disorganization which would be created by their bankruptcy. He announced with a flourish of trumpets, in 1904, the Grand Trunk Pacific, and later he placed the Canadian Northern upon the same basis as a national undertaking. The Government formed in 1911 inherited the conditions created by that policy.

We had to deal with the situation as best we could. When we proposed the loan to the Canadian Northern in 1914, Sir Wilfrid Laurier moved a resolution declaring that the Government ought to acquire all the stock of the Canadian Northern railway by arbitration, and that a maximum value of 30 million dollars should be fixed. In 1914 the Government as then constituted acquired 40 millions of C.N.R. stock without any payment whatever and we now propose to acquire the balance by arbitration. That is precisely the method Sir Wilfrid Laurier himself suggested. It does not lie in his mouth to say that the course which he solemnly proposed

SIR ROBERT BORDEN NOMINATED FOR KING'S

(Canadian Press Despatch.) KENTVILLE, N. S., Nov. 18.—Sir Robert Borden was nominated by the Conservative Unionists of King's County on Saturday. After the nomination the Premier left for Ottawa.

EVACUATION IS ALMOST COMPLETE

VENICE, Nov. 17.—The evacuation of Venice is almost complete, the city having undergone the same treatment as Treviso and Vicenza, with the difference that its art treasures were so numerous and of such colossal proportions that an army of workmen was required to transport them. The great pictures, carvings, fine glassware and ivories and similar art treasures were transported easily, being removed at the beginning of the war. The present removal of art treasures included the heaviest works, which up to this time had been protected by sand bags or hid in cellars. The most important was the Bartolomeo Colleoni monument, the last work of Andrea Verrocchio, the master of Leonardo Da Vinci of Mona Lisa fame. It was erected in the 15th century and was considered one of the finest equestrian statues in the world. The four gilded bronze horses from the Basilicas of Saint Mary also were removed. This was their fifth journey as they were taken from Rome to Constantinople and then in 1204 to Venice. More than a hundred years ago Napoleon took them to Paris, whence they were returned to Venice. They now probably will be housed temporarily in the Museum of the Baths of Diocletian at Rome.

GOOD PROGRESS IN EAST AFRICA

(Canadian Press Despatch.) LONDON, Nov. 17.—An official statement on the campaign in east Africa tonight says, "On the Makonde Plateau German East Africa, Wednesday, we occupied Mt. Mt. after slight opposition, and on Thursday occupied Chiwaka, after a sharp engagement. Forty-six German European and 427 Askaris were captured. "Since November 1st, our columns have accounted for on all fronts, a total of 473 German Europeans and 1,072 Askaris killed or captured, two naval guns, and 33 machine guns, as well as a quantity of material. "The enemy has been driven from the whole of the Mahenge area."
