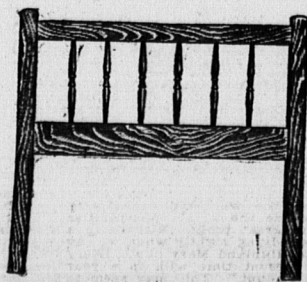
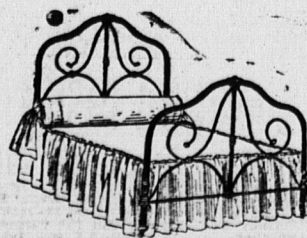

UNITE THE GOVERNMENT RAILWAYS

Before the union of the Provinces New Brunswick and Nova Scotia each owned and operated a Government railway. These were known respectively as the Nova Scotia Railway and the European and North American Railway. At Confederation these were united and extended under the common name of the Intercolonial Railway and became the property of the Dominion. Prince Edward Island also owned and operated a railway when the Province was "taken in" by Canada. This railway, like those of the sister Provinces, became the property of Canada, but is still called the Prince Edward Island Railway, as if it belonged to the Province.

All the Government railways are under one management, and why are they all not called by one name? The Grand Trunk and the Canadian Pacific system are each grouped under one name. On the other hand, if the name of the Province is to remain as the name of the railway in this Island, why was not the name of Nova Scotia Railway retained for that portion of the Intercolonial which is located in the Province of that name? If the point be taken that our Province is an Island, the ready answer comes that so is Cape Breton but the Government railway there bears the name Intercolonial.

It is obvious that all the Canadian Government railways should bear one name and that the idea expressed by the words Prince Edward Island Railway is misleading. Our tourist visitors are led to suppose that the railway belongs to this Province, and when told that it is the property of Canada are moved to enquire why the railway owned by the Dominion bears the name of the Province. If the principal portion of the Government railway system is to bear the name Intercolonial, the Island portion of that system should bear the same name.

Some may ask, What's in a name? but there is more behind this than a mere question of name. The Government railway system should be one not only in name but in fact, with through ticketing of passengers, through rating of freight, equal rates for equal distances and equal express rates and privileges, with the same competition on all parts of the system. These we do not enjoy. A common name for the entire system would prepare the way for uniformity in all these matters and for even handed justice in the operation of the entire system. And it would also prepare the way for all-rail connection by means of the Tunnel at the Capes, making the Government railway system one in fact, and making the union of this Province with Canada a reality instead of the sham that it is.

Successive governments of Canada have always treated the Island as if it were a mere appendage, instead of an integral part of the Dominion, and have treated the Island Railway as if it were a separate and not an integral part of the Government railway system, always to our disadvantage and loss. They have kept its accounts separate, charging us with the loss in its operation, which loss is due to the fact that it is not connected with the mainland system, and during five months of the year practically cut off from communication therewith. Let us have separate accounting for the branch from Oxford Junction to Stellarton, or of the branch from Chatham to Fredericton, or of that portion of the main line from Miramichi to Quebec and it will be found

there are worse paying sections of the I. C. R. than this.

It follows that our representatives in Parliament, our Provincial Government, our Boards of Trade and the Maritime Board of Trade should use their most strenuous endeavors—

To bring about the union of the Government Railway system; under one name; with uniformity of control and management; with all-rail connection at the Capes; with equality of rates, local and through, for freight and passengers and with equality of express rates. In other words as we have already said, to make the Government railway system one in name and in fact, and in that way to make this Island Province a contented prosperous, integral part of the great Dominion. United and determined effort will bring this about to the incalculable benefit of all concerned.

EXHIBITION TIME.

This week and next the farmers, stockmen, dairymen, fruit growers and others of our Island Province will be showing off the best of their products in the face of eager competitors and an admiring public. Beginning at Georgetown, where the disturbance has lasted for one day, the Exhibition storm centre will shift to Summerside on Friday and hold the town for two days. Then on Tuesday next the trouble will begin in Charlottetown and continue four days.
