Cancel Contract For Two Tugs
OTTAWA, June 22 (CP) - A contract with Ferguson Brothers of Pictou, N.S. for construction of two steel tugs was cancelled, after work had begun, to make the yards available for ship repairs. Munitions Minister Howse told the House of Commons today.

He was replying to a question asked by Clarence Gillis (C.C.F. Cape Breton South) who said he understood that 30 per cent of construction had been completed and 97 per cent of necessary materials were on hand to complete the job.

Mr. Howse said the contract had been a mistake since the Ferguson yards at Pictou had been improved for the purpose of ship repair work for which they were needed constantly.

He said steel tugs could be built at many other shipyards and the materials now in the Ferguson yards for this contract would be sent to the Montreal dry dock company which would complete the contract.

Mr. Howse said only about 10 per cent of the work had been done when the contract was cancelled Saturday. All available facilities in Pictou were being used to capacity, he said.
