POLICE COURT.—At the Police Court yesterday a case of breach of the Prohibition Act was fined \$200.00 or three months. There was also tried a case of assault, brought on information laid by Mrs. Thea Bell against Miss Ellen McCloskey. In this case, judgement was reserved for a week. The case is of some interest, for the reason that the alleged assault consisted of a search of the person of the complainant by the defendant, during a prohibition raid at which police officers were present who were assisted by the defendant. It was not claimed that any violence was used in the search. The questions which arose were (1) Did defendant, not being herself an officer, have authority to search person of complainant? (2) Does the Prohibition Act confer a right to search the persons of parties in their own house or merely on the street?
