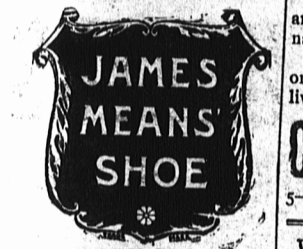

The schooner Freddie A. Higgins cleared from Boston May 6th, bound for Moncton, P. E. I.

There will be service in the Church of England, Long Creek on Sunday, May 12th, at 11 a.m.

Mr. Bayer, proprietor of Gasvint Genzel & Co's studio, photographed the signalling corps officers at the drill shed yesterday afternoon.

The S.S. Northumberland left yesterday morning for Pictou, and arrived there at 11 a.m. She will return today bringing all the freight she can.

Mrs. J. E. Jay who has been visiting her mother, Mrs. McEwen, train despatcher at this city, returned to her home at Piquid yesterday afternoon.

Malcolm McLeod, of this city, suffered the loss yesterday of a fine barn, situated on his farm at Colville. There was a quantity of hay, about forty tons, stored therein which was also lost. The property was partly covered by insurance.

The cargo brought by the Minto yesterday in addition to about 130 bags of mail and her passengers, consisted of 5 bags of seed and 15 empty egg cases. The Minto has capacity for nearly a dozen cars of freight—and there is plenty of it at Pictou.

In referring to the business of Hyndman & Co. yesterday morning the Guardian through a printer's mistake was sorry to say that the firm had during the year in business "written over 1000 in Fire & Marine losses." This should have read "paid over One Million Dollars in Fire & Marine losses."

The schooner Henry Ellsworth, Capt. W. W. Carlton, which sailed out of this port on Wednesday morning with a cargo of hay, shipped by Carvell Bros., of Pictou, succeeded in reaching her journey's end this evening. This is a creditable performance for Capt. Carlton, and entitles him to mention as the first captain to make Pictou from this port this Spring.

Winnipeg advises that General Superintendent Brown will take the position of general manager of the C. N. R. shortly. This will leave the position of general superintendent open, into which will step J. A. Cameron, at present superintendent of the Lake Superior Division with headquarters at Port Arthur. Then Benjamin Chappell at present superintendent of terminals will be promoted to Mr. Cameron's position. Benjamin Chappell is known to many of the Guardian's readers, and his friends will be glad to learn this news. He is a son of John J. Chappell, of the P. E. I. Railway and has won rapid success since leaving his native Province.

The cable repair steamer Minia owned by the Anglo-American Telegraph Co., arrived in this port yesterday afternoon. She comes for the purpose of repairing the cable connecting this province with the mainland, which is laid between Cape Traverse on this side and Cape Tormentine, N. B. The cable it will be remembered gave out last December, and it has been impossible to repair it since that date because of the ice. The Minia is thoroughly equipped for the work of laying and repairing cables. She is a large steamer and is commanded by Captain J. C. G. G. The electrical engineer is Dr. McCavanagh. The Minia has just come from the coast of Newfoundland.

Mr. W. F. Dolan, of Bangor, M., was in Moncton recently en route to P. E. I., in search of truck horses. Mr. Dolan says that heavy horses find easy sale in the States at the present time.

The S.S. Minto leaves for Pictou this morning at 7 with mails and passengers and the following freight: 14 boxes young pigs, 330 bags potatoes, 136 cases eggs, 144 tons hay, 4 quarters beef, 1 horse and half a carload of way freight.

A somewhat reassuring telegram was received by R. B. Norton on Wednesday evening regarding his daughter Miriam. The information conveyed was to the effect that the pain from which Miss Norton had been suffering, had been relieved, although her temperature was still high.

The arrival of the S.S. Halifax at this port has been deferred for a week on account of the quantity of ice obstructing the route. A telegram received by Mr. Moulinquet, the agent of the Canada Atlantic & Plant S. S. Line at this port, states that the steamer will sail from Boston for here on Saturday the 18th inst.

J. P. Woodbury, of the Queen Hotel returned yesterday from Pictou, where he had taken a shipment of horses. Almost immediately on his return he purchased another fine lot. Horse business is booming here this spring, and the splendid animals shipped are proving to the outside world that this Province is the place to raise good horses.

Messrs Fraser and McGillivray, proprietors of the Riverside Park, Vernon River Bridge, have commenced repairing the track for training and will have it ready about May 25th, when John McCabe expects to open up the stables for training purposes. Mr. McCabe is well known to horsemen, to be one of the best trainers and drivers on Prince Edward Island. The annual races will be held on July 10th when a liberal purse will be given for the following classes: 3 minute class, 240 class and free for all. It is the intention of the managers to put the track in first class condition, making improvements ingrading under directions of an engineer who has had experience in this kind of work. Also improvements on stands, stalls and to the stables. Several new stalls will be added. With these improvements this track will easily outclass any on Prince Edward Island. The racing held there last year was the best managed and the most successful held on Prince Edward Island.—Cor.

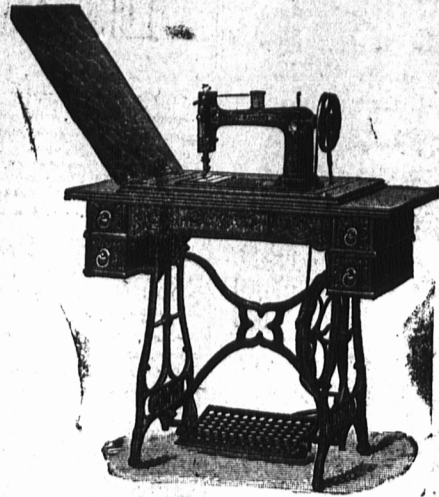
