THE Hon. David Leard, Indian Commissioner, arrived in the city last night, and is here to-day making arrangements for the mass gathering of Indians which will take at Shagannapi upon the occasion of the royal visit. Mr. Leard is a veteran of the Northwest, having been the first lieutenant governor of the Territories. When he first took up his residence at Fort Pelly, and later at Battleford, his secretary was A. B. Forget, now lieutenant governor. It was rather a curious circumstance that when Mr. Forget vacated his position of Indian commissioner to become lieutenant governor, his place was taken by his former chief. Although well up in years, Mr. Leard is still active and vigorous, his commanding height making him noticeable wherever he goes.—Calgary Herald.
