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Released On Bond

BOSTON, Mass., Sept. 2.—The motorship, Grace Marie, seized off the Maine coast, July 31, today was released on bond by order of the U. S. District Court, and departed for Publico, N. S. New Duties September 6

LONDON, Sept. 2.—New duties on certain foreign imports recommended by the import duties advisory committee, will come into force on September 6. The duty on leather gloves is increased from 20 to 30 per cent. Duty on scissors is raised to encourage the home industry. Other articles affected include hair combs, wrapping paper, poultry and sausages.

FISH AND GAME ANNUAL MEETING

Various Matters Having To Do With Association Work Were Discussed. Mr. Gilbert Gaudet Reappointed President.

At the annual meeting of the Fish and Game Association held last evening in the Board of Trade Rooms, resolutions were passed expressing appreciation to the Government for the placing of a bounty on stunks in accordance with the request of the Association, and instructing the incoming executive to endeavour to have the province given special consideration as regards the shooting of plover and other shore birds.

Party Of 84 Business Men Leave Montreal On New Northland For Nfld.—Will Call At Charlottetown.

MONTREAL, Que., Sept. 2.—On their way to the annual convention of the Canadian Chamber of Commerce in Halifax, Sept. 13-15, a party of eighty-four business men leaves here tomorrow for Newfoundland. The purpose of the Newfoundland trip is to promote good feeling between the two Dominions. The party, which will sail in the Clarke steamship New Northland, is made up of prominent business men from Western Canada, Ontario, Quebec and the Maritime Provinces. The tour will touch at Quebec, Charlottetown, Sydney and St. Pierre, Miquelon, before landing at St. John's, Nfld. At St. John's the delegates will be guests of the Government and of the Board of Trade.

New Disclosures In Shubenacadie Fatal Bank Holdup

Dramatic Statements Made By Witnesses At Preliminary Hearing At Windsor, N. S. Yesterday.

WINDSOR, N. S., Sept. 2.—Dramatic disclosures about how plans for the fatal Shubenacadie bank holdup were finalized in a lonely wood lot on the outskirts of Halifax, featured the preliminary hearing for Sidney A. Rafuse, former manager of the Royal Bank at Louisbourg, who today was committed for trial on a charge of conspiring to rob the Shubenacadie branch on August 23. Rafuse, brother-in-law of Gerald Freckleton, who was killed by police during a gun fight in the bank, was committed by Justice of the Peace Charles L. Wood. Date for the trial was set for September 20.

ISSUES LABOR DAY MESSAGE

OTTAWA, Sept. 2.—Complimenting labor on the "patient courageous and loyal manner in which the hardships imposed by the present depression had been borne," Hon. W. A. Gordon, Minister of Labor, tonight issued his "Labor Day" message. The Minister notes the widening of the interests now pursued by labor organizations, and points to the great diversity of duties which his own department is now required to perform as reflecting that widening.
