THE NEW YORK LETTER.

Richmond Pearson Hobson, who was kissed many times, and General Wheeler, who was never kissed at all, during the late war with Spain, appeared in Carnegie Hall on Sunday afternoon and addressed 35,000 New Yorkers in that impressive and vast auditorium. "For Men Only" ran the invitations, but 100 beautiful and resplendent maidens assisted the chorus of 500 which filled the tiers of seats behind the platform. It was a Y. M. C. A. affair, the object being to have Messrs. Hobson and Wheeler, both Y. M. C. A. men, speak on the work done by that organization in the army. But hundreds flocked to the great building at Broadway and 57th Street simply out of eager curiosity for a glimpse of two of the most talked-of persons in the late unpleasantness. Hobson, whose osculatory indiscretions gave a new verb to the Unabridged; Wheeler, the splendid

patriot and hero of the Blue and of the Grey. Wheeler is a little brisk man, with bald crown, a ruddy oval face set with piercing eyes, and a sparse gray beard; quite southern in his appearance and vocal inflection, but as brusque and animated in manner as any son of the North. There's "army" practice for you, which gives to meaner souls only the affectation of alertness. General Howard, a veteran of the Civil War, who had chased the little man from the south through the brushwood of Tennessee way back in the 60's, introduced Gen. Wheeler with a few kind words so adroitly happy. "I introduce to you with much love my old enemy and now my brother under the Stars and Stripes, Gen. Wheeler," he said. It was quite thrilling. Up stepped the little man with the keen eyes, and faced the great audience, but no sign of compunction or of servility concerning the Lost Cause. "It was a psychological moment."

His subject was "My Country, Its Progress and Triumphs" but he kept almost studiously to the Philippine situation, on which he speaks as one with authority and not as the anti-imperialist. He was down there a while. He said that 11,000,000 Filipinos "want a stable Government" while Aguinaldo and his followers want something else. It is America's destiny and duty to provide the "stable" Government, but General "Joe" failed to add that only an Augean stable has been provided apparently so far. I noticed the grizzled little soldier did not give way like the speakers who preceded and followed him, to any sentimental compliments on the "United Country" etc. over which the others spread a thick meringue of gush. He knew, wise and honest little warrior, that North and South are as widely sundered to-day as in '64, nor will he ever dishonor his honorable affection for the still dear Lost Cause by bricking words of sugared hypocrisy. There were the others who were blatant and bold in their speech of the "United Land" and the "reconciled South." But the grim little soldier said no word.

There was enough applause to greet both Southerners but Hobson got probably the most. He's a good-looking athletic young blood with clean shaven face and twinkling eyes, but his trousers were bagged at the knees in true Southern fashion. His address was in abominably bad taste, filled with salad rhetoric and overplayed gesture, the elocution inconspicuously evangelistic and the style too pompously ponderous. Such are the fruits of inexperience, of course, but all this is overlooked in a brave fellow whose nerves are good, vitality magnetic, and record manly. Hobson

spoke on "The Life and Services of Admiral Phillips" but like Wheeler his text was only a peg on which he hung all manner of "immaterial, irrelevant and incompetent" matter. The big audience waited to the close delighted by the magnificent cornet rendering of the "Lost Chord" and the "Holy City," to see if the finale might include any "kissing" tableaux. There were 100 maidens sveite and sweet, on the platform, and the weakness of the Hero of the Merrimac was not disremembered. In every tender and gentle breast of that 100 there must have been osculatory flutterings at sight of the brave and handsome lieutenant as he strode up and down the stage with declamatory gesture and ornate phrase. But though there was much eager shaking of hands, of both Southerners there was no recrudescence of the old frailty. Hobson kissed not.
