Heads Three Pro Leagues

Joe F. Carr, president of the National Professional Football Association, the American Basketball League, and the Columbus American Association baseball club, never turned down a "thank you" job of managing or directing athletics.

Six years ago in Canton, O., a group of men interested in professional football organized a national league with Carr at its head. It was a "thank you" job to begin with, and Carr did not want it. He felt it would be better to devote his time to earning a living as a traveling salesman. But he was prevailed upon to accept. He drew no salary for the first year. But after that, the league started to grow, and Carr began to devote more and more of his time to its affairs.

Two years ago, professional basketball backers, seeing the success of the football organization, made him a proposition to organize a similar league of basketball teams and offered him the presidency of it. That, too, has boomed, and last summer, when the Columbus baseball team was struggling in the throes of the worst slump in Association history, its owners decided to make Carr the president.

In 1914, when Carr was president of the Ohio State League of professional baseball teams, it had a record for sending players to the majors. Billy Southworth of the Cards, who clinched the second game of the recent World Series with his homer, was one of them.

Billiard Play Holds Action For The Year

Active Preparation Commenced in Two Different Branches

NEW YORK, Oct. 21.—Active preparations have begun for championship billiard play for the year. The first down for decision is the pocket billiard tournament, scheduled to be held next month, which will bring together the ten outstanding players. The competition at this style of billiards has been unusually keen during the past season and should result in some exceptional playing.

The second title event will be at 18.2 balkline, with Willie Hoppe, long identified with this style of game, as one of the entertainers. This time, however, Hoppe is appearing in the role of challenger. Eric Hagenlacher of Germany is the defending champion. It would not be surprising to see Hoppe enter this tournament a favorite, as he rates far above the present champion as a competitive player.

While the balkline and pocket billiard stars are tuning up for action these are signs of life among the three-cushion headliners. It now seems likely that the first championship match will be held next February with Otto Reisel defending his title against Johnny Layton. It has been ruled definitely that Hoppe cannot compete for the three-cushion crown until after Layton gets his chance.

There has been more action in billiards this season than in the last ten years, billiard leaders have noted. More young players have taken up the cue, and this is evidence enough, it is said, that the drive is on to produce players to take a place of Hoppe, Schaefer and Cochran when they are forced to retire.

Kid Roy Retains His Title

MONTREAL, Oct. 21.—Leo (Kid) Roy, of Montreal, featherweight champion of Canada, retained his title here tonight when he fought a ten-round draw with Vic Foley, of Vancouver. The crowd hissed the decision.

The bout was a clever exhibition to the various styles of boxing. Both lads changed their tactics frequently to bring victory and as one fighter adopted a new style the other offset it by brilliant defensive work. Both men fought a cautious battle and at times came to clinches to avoid punishment.

Roy showed a stronger defensive than his opponent and throughout kept himself so close that he earned the draw decision. Roy invariably scored points when he came out of a crouch position to land left and right swings while on the other hand Foley did his best fighting when he chose the more open style at which he was master.

Rileys "Old Swimm Hole" Not Quiet Now

GREENFIELD, Ind., Oct. 20.—The laughter of children at play, drowns out "the gurgle of the water round the drift just below" the "old swimm' hole" and few of the surroundings as James Whitcomb Riley knew them, during his boyhood days here, remain.

A Riley memorial park with a playground borders Brandywine creek at the "old swimm' hole" which the Hoosier poet immortalized in rhyme.

Traffic on All Sides

A railroad bridge, an electric line trestle and the National Trail, an important East and West motor highway, cross the creek near the "swimm' hole." The pastoral quietude of the spot, broken only by the hoarse solo of a bullfrog, or the plaintive call of a dove, as Riley knew it six decades ago, has been lost in the march of the years.

Few of the heavy flogged trees that lined the banks, "In the long lay days "Where the humdrum of school made so many runaways, "How pleasant was the journey down the old dusty lane "Where the tracks of our bare feet was all print so plain" remain. The Brandywine itself, once a sizeable stream, now is sluggish and shallow and contains scarcely enough water for swimming.

Home a Museum

Greenfield backs contentedly in the glory that came to her favorite son. The distinction of having been his birthplace and the centre of many of the scenes he sketched in rhyme, is one of the city's most stable commercial assets.

The severe two-story frame house on Main Street where Riley was born is occupied by his widowed sister-in-law and her sister. For ten cents, visitors are permitted to roam the rooms and finger the possessions of Riley which still are retained here.

Before he discovered a bent for verse making, Riley was sign painter and several examples of his craftsmanship are preserved here.
