## BANN MADISON SQUARE GARDEN IN LEAGUE YET

### No Bouts For Week—Marks and Two Managers Suspended

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—(Madison Square Garden, largest metropolitan indoor arena, was suspended today from staging boxing bouts for one week by the State Athletic Commission, as a result of the match last Friday night between Pancho Villa, world's flyweight champion, and George Marks, of California, which was robbed of its title aspect when Marks entered the ring four and a half pounds overweight.

At the same time the Commission suspended for sixty days Marks, his manager, Charley Cook, and Frank Churchill, manager of Villa. Marks and Cook were set down for failure of the boxer to make the flyweight limit of 112 pounds, while Churchill was banned for refusing to claim the weight forfeit of \$1,250 required of Marks.

## U. S. Olympic Team Back From France

### UNSUCCESSFUL SPEED AND FANCY SKATERS AND SKIING TEAMS REACH NEW YORK ON BERENGARIA

NEW YORK, Feb. 14.—Three divisions of the winter sports group of the United States Olympic team—the speed and fancy skaters and skiing teams—returned today on the Berengaria from their unsuccessful competition with the nations of the world at Chamonix, France, in which Finland finished first.

Of the hockey team which made best showing of any of the groups, getting to the final match which Canada won, only one member, Clarence Abel, of St. Paul, returned. The other players remained in Europe for several matches.

The champions, although decisively outplayed, reached the first intermission leading by two to nothing. Broadbent and Denenny had made good on the few opportunities the visitors had of scoring while at the other end of the rink, Benedetti was turning shots aside with painful regularity.

Yesterday arrangements were completed for the purchase of land enough to establish a ring of aerodromes around the city. New types of planes capable of carrying new devices to enable movements to be made in combination by groups of planes at night and capable also of attaining extraordinary speed which until now has been regarded as only in the range of the fantastic are now being built in considerable quantities while delicate sound instruments capable of detecting the approach of aircraft at heretofore unheard of distances have also been perfected.
