Board equal to that to be had in Charlottetown for \$3.50 per week—costs in Winnipeg double as much—\$7.00 per week. Clothing and food-stuffs are just as cheap west as east and bargains in various lines are often to be had in Winnipeg for cash never available in smaller places."

JACK FROST who has been for some days coyly flirting with the weather in the region of zero changed his tactics on Tuesday night and made the mercury "skidoo" away below the mark. It became bitterly cold and yesterday citizen met citizen and each looked at the other's red nose and cold low the temperature was, while their breath ascended into the chilly sky like steam from a locomotive. Guesstimated from 12 to 10 below, but the official reading of the thermometer is as follows: Tuesday night 9 below; yesterday 10 a. m. 8 below; 4 p. m. 10 below; 9 p. m. 10 below. The strong wind which blew all day doubtless made it appear colder than it was.

CAPTAIN HENRY COOK, officer in charge of the Marconi system of Cape Bear, says that the monopoly of the Anglo-American allows the Marconi company to accept Marine Department business only, which they do, and for which purpose the station was built. The captain says if any arrangements are to be made, they have to be made with the Marconi Wireless Telegraph Company of Montreal. The captain declines to give any information but refers all interested parties to the Montreal office. There is no question as to the wireless system handling the Island business, as 40 messages daily have been sent and received on an average, from one Marconi station to another at high rate of speed.

Word has been received by the local Department of Agriculture from J. A. Riddick, Dairy Commissioner, that he is arranging to send Professor Whitley of the Live Stock Department, Ottawa, and Joseph Burgess of the Dairy Division, to this Province, February 17, to continue the classes in dairying. Last December the Provincial Department inaugurated this work by holding classes at Charlottetown, Souris, Kensington, Summerside and Ellerslie, under the direction of Stephen Elliott, and Ross. This work has been continued from time to time by Mr. Ross who illustrates his addresses with lantern slides, in place of the cattle themselves. This work will be further extended by these experts from the Dairy Division at Ottawa, who will spend a month in this Province at this work. It is to be hoped that these meetings, which will be advertised under the auspices of the Provincial Dairy Association, will be well attended and that they will prove to be a great stimulus to that most important industry, dairying.

No foreign mail was received in the city yesterday, the Stanley being unable to get into Georgetown harbor on account of thick weather. The Minto arrived in Pictou with the mail and passengers from the Island. Last night the foreign mail left the city for Georgetown about 10 o'clock.

The Methodist Sunday school concert at Brackley Point Road, took place on Monday, January 14, in the church before a very large audience, Rev. G. F. Dawson presiding. The opening chorus was given by the choir, also recitations, solos and duets, by different members of the Sunday school, the children in particular, doing remarkably well. Two pleasing duets were given by Rev. G. F. and Mrs. Dawson. A pleasing violin solo was rendered by Mrs. Bruce Macmillan, accompanied by Miss Taper on the organ. Mrs. Macmillan, organist of the choir, was presented with a new year's gift from the members of the choir for her valued services. Wm. Pierce, who has been superintendent of the Sunday school, also leader of the prayer meetings for the past 15 years, gave an address on S. S. work, stating his progress, after which he was presented with a nice large hymn book, monogram inscribed, accompanied with a few touching words from the Pastor, to which he feelingly replied. At the close the audience were treated to candy and nuts, after which, the National Anthem was sung. A few friends from the city being present at the concert, spent the rest of the evening at the home of Alphonso and Mrs. Bryenton where they were royally entertained. The evening was spent in music and song and the hours passed all too quickly when the time came for the closing song.
