through the untiring efforts of all
workers not only on the Board but
in the several excellent Auxiliaries and
the many friends throughout the pro-
vince, that we are able to again re-
cord another year of real success.
It may not be out of place to re-

mind ourselves, that these workers,
friends, are entirely voluntary and do
it with a desire to care for little ones
who without such a home might be-
come wrecks on the Sea of Life.

Our endeavors are directed in these
main spheres in the Home, in the
Board of Trustees and in the various
Auxiliaries, in all of them the work
has been conducted very smoothly.
Nothing of a serious nature has oc-
curred. Our expenditures have been
very closely watched and the children
for whose good our Institution exists,
are, we believe being well trained and
cared for.

Criticism is often offered because
some children under our care receive
more comforts than in homes from
which they come. As a Public Inskit-
ution we must endeavor to keep the
children in perfect health and pro-
vide the best training it is possible
to give.

Under its special committee the
routine work of the Home has been
very successfully managed. The Staff
has had but few changes during the
year and is continuing to give very
efficient service.

Our Adoption Committee has as
usual been kept very busy. There's a
most difficult position. When an
application is received they are often
criticised whether their decision is
Yes or No. However, when we re-
member that some members of this
committee at least have served con-
tinuously for almost ten years, it
would seem that their judgments
would be backed by much experience.

The remarkable work of our Fin-
ance Committee will be seen by the
statements. We cannot pass without
a special mention of their exceptional
success during a difficult period. The
Chairman of this committee has been
untiring in her efforts and her excep-
tional ability has been invaluable to
the Institution.

Our Endowment Account has re-
ceived some further additions during
the year. The revenue derived from
the interest of these investments is
now of considerable assistance to our
finances. In years past a number of
Bequests had been almost lost sight
of; it is our intention to revive these
and so a list will be found in this
volume, which we have endeavored
to make complete and which we pur-
pose to continue.

The Farm still continues under rent
and we believe is being improved.
The prevailing opinion seems to be
that it would be best to dispose of
the greater part of the Farm; the
committee has this in mind and
would sell on reasonable terms.

It is our pleasure to report a con-
siderable reduction in the Debt this
year; you will notice by the state-
ments that we owe now to the Bank
on Demand \$3,000.00; this compared
with the previous year shows a re-
duction of \$2,345.42.

Very few of us have known this
worthy Institution free of Debt so
should we all not strive during the
coming year to reach that desirable
position.

In conclusion may we as a Board
extend our grateful thanks to all
friends throughout the province—the
clergy—the members of the several
Auxiliaries—the individual collectors
and indeed all who in any way as-
sisted in achieving this success.

MEDICAL REPORT

The following medical report was
presented by Dr. F. W. Tidmarsh:
I have the honor to submit here-
with my report for the year ending
December 31st, 1929.

During the year there were thirty-
eight complete physical examinations
made on children prior to their ad-
mission to the orphanage. Seventeen
minor operations were performed on
these children at the Prince Edward
Island Hospital in order that any

physical handicap might be removed
before they were received under our
care. Many of these children were
considerably undernourished.

There has been a daily average of
forty-nine children in the home,
thirty of whom are under six years
of age with eleven on specially pre-
pared formulae.

There was an epidemic of whooping
cough during the summer months.
This arose following contact with
children attending an Orange Tea
Celebration on the Orphanage
grounds. There were no complica-
tions and all children made a com-
plete recovery.

I am again able to report for the
sixth consecutive year that there have
been no deaths among the children
committed to our care.

All necessary dental work has been
attended to by Dr. Ayers.

The food supply and sanitation has
been maintained at the high stand-
ard of former years.

The very satisfactory state of
health maintained by all the children
is due to the excellent hygienic care
given to them by Miss Beers and her
competent staff.

ADOPTION COMMITTEE REPORT

During the year 1929 we had a
daily average of forty-nine (49)
children in residence; thirty-nine (39)
children were admitted, an increase
of seventeen (17), and thirty-three
(33) were adopted from the Home, an
increase of ten (10) over previous
year. All children admitted subject
to our adoption rules.

The children's ages range from four
months to thirteen years.

Our little deaf mute has finished
another year at the School for the
Deaf at Halifax with remarkable
progress.

The same high standard of medical
supervision has been generously given
by Dr. Tidmarsh and we are very
happy to report another year with
No Deaths.

Much credit is due Miss Beers and
her Staff for the excellent condition
of the children and the Home.

INTERESTED IN CANADA

(Special to the Guardian)
MONTREAL, Que., June 19.—The
people of Australia are becoming in-
creasingly interested in development
in Canada and an increasing number
of them are taking advantage of the
opportunity to visit the Dominion
when crossing from the Antipodes to
Britain and vice versa, stated G. F.
Johnston, general agent of the Cana-
dian National Railways at Sydney,
Australia, who is in Montreal on a
business visit. Australians are keenly
interested in the Canadian Rockies,
Mr. Johnston continued, and many
of them get their first glimpse of
snow when they are travelling on
Canadian National trains through
these mountains. The great wheat
fields of the prairie provinces and
the industrial developments of East-
ern Canada and of the United States
are also a matter of general inter-
est to the Australian traveller, who
consequently is keen to visit these
areas during his travels.

Speaking of economic conditions in
Australia Mr. Johnston stated that
that country in common with the
other countries of the world is hav-
ing a trade depression. While Aus-
tralia is a vast country its crops are
almost limited to wheat and wool and
low prices for both of these products
have reduced the purchasing power
of the Common wealth to a great ex-
tent. However he anticipated that
this depression would show signs of
improvement and that the country
would get back to normal within a
year or two. Australia is making a
bid for the tourist travel of North
America and Britain and a national
travel association has been formed
with offices in London and on this
continent to endeavor to turn the
tide of tourist traffic toward their
country whose seasons are the oppo-
site of those here in Sydney. Frost
and snow are unknown while the
scenic beauties of the Commonwealth
are such as to delight the traveller.
