

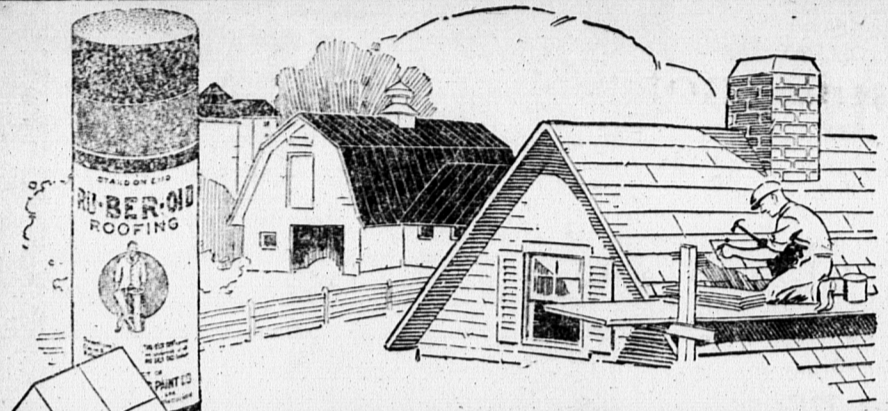

said, "and that is Money. Make it, honestly if you can; but MAKE IT!"

My hon. friend, at the last election, told his followers practically what they were to say. And naturally they followed their leader's advice. They told the people all those bogie stories—told them there was enough revenue if the salaries of officials were cut down—told them that with economy it would be possible to double the salaries of the teachers. That was what my hon. friend's followers told their workers and that was what the workers spread throughout the country. The consequence was that my hon. friend and his followers were elected.

What happened then? The leader of the Government has told us himself. He has repudiated all those statements spread by his party throughout the country. He says that pre-election promises do not count. And so we claim that, because he has misled the people by his utterances and by the utterances of his candidates, he has no mandate to impose this unexpected taxation without again consulting the country. He has rightly said himself, that you cannot have taxation without representation. Not only was this taxation levied without representation, but it was levied in direct opposition to the pre-election promises of the Premier and his followers.

The Premier now tries to defend himself by quoting Mr. Meighen's reply in the Dominion Parliament to the leader of the Opposition that his mandate was his majority in the House. But he says Mr. Meighen should not carry on because his Government was elected for war purposes only. Well, at least Mr. Meighen's Government is not carrying on anything in opposition to pre-election promises.

That is where the difference comes in between him and my hon. friends.

Now, the Government proposes to spend next year well over a million dollars. And these are the same gentlemen who when in opposition made these halls ring with denunciations when we were spending just about half that amount! And where is this money going to? What great improvements are being carried on? Can the Government point to any great things they are doing? True, they are paying a small increase to the teachers. The Department of Agriculture last year spent actually less for agriculture than the year previously. I fail absolutely to see—and the country will fail to see—where, with all these revenues, any great benefit is coming to the people.

We have been treated during the Session to many speeches with reference to the Guardian newspaper. We have seen men after man on the Government side get up and whine about the Guardian newspaper and implore the Guardian newspaper to cease its criticism. The trouble was that the Guardian uncovered a very sore spot and applied very drastic remedies to it. Naturally our friends on the Government side began to squeal—it hurt severely, and they thought that the best way to gag it was to pass a resolution condemning the Guardian newspaper. Well, if my hon. friends would only put their ears to the ground and listen to what the people in the country are saying about them, the expressions of disapproval in the Guardian would be mild in comparison. And when my hon. friends pass a vote of censure on a newspaper which represents the opinion of their constituents they are simply passing a vote of censure against the people of this Province; whose opinions the Guardian is voicing.

My hon. friends know all this very well. But of course they lay all the burden of the trouble caused throughout the country on the Guardian. If it had not been for that newspaper, they say, the people would be perfectly satisfied. In fact, the people are satisfied, well if the people are satisfied why worry? Why pass resolutions condemning the Guardian? Why should my hon. friends try to white-wash themselves if they are already spotted? To an onlooker it was really a most ridiculous performance, an opera bouffe.

In conclusion let me say again that the Government find themselves today in a very precarious situation. They attained power by misrepresentations, they deceived the people and the people are resenting it. If they have found trouble—if they are faced with difficulties—those troubles and difficulties are entirely of their own making. A Nemesis is on their track—they have fallen into the trap which they intended for somebody else. While they were making difficulties throughout the country—impressing the country with the fact that taxes were not necessary and that there was sufficient revenue—they thought they were making trouble for the Conservative Government. This has been a boomerang in their hands—for whilst striking down the Conservative Government it came back on my hon. friend the leader of the Government and his party.

Mr. Speaker, I may have detained the House longer than I intended. I am sure that if I had an opportunity of continuing my address within a reasonable time after I had begun it there would have been no necessity for thus detaining the House.


"Rainmaking" Not Feasible

REGINA, Sask., April 2.—Replying to a communication from the Saskatchewan department of agriculture, C. F. Marvin, chief of the United States weather bureau, brands any attempt to "make rain" as a foolish waste of time.

The department sought information on the activities of Charles M. Hatfield, widely advertised as a "rainmaker."

Here is the answer: "I have received your letter enclosing a clipping relative to the rainmaking claims of Mr. Hatfield and asking my comments regarding the matter.

"In answer, permit me to say that a great many schemes for the artificial production of rain have been proposed and many of them have been submitted to the weather bureau, but the most elementary consideration of physics, chemistry and simple calculations suffice to convince scientists that these schemes are wholly impossible.

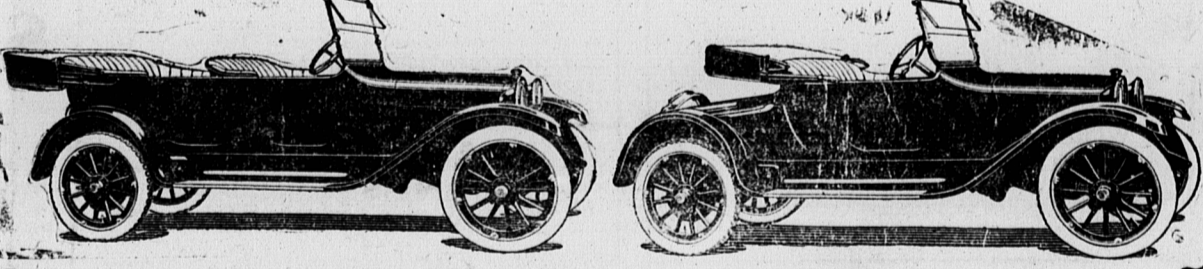
