St. Pats Won From The Seattle Mets

SEATTLE, Dec 10—Scoring the second victory of their strenuous western tour, St. Pat's of Toronto, defeated the Seattle Mets, pro-League, here last night in a heavy scoring game in which the victors came out on the long end of a seven to six score.

The game was a battle royal from the first face off, from which Riley skated into Toronto territory and scored within the first 17 seconds. Riley was the biggest stumbling block in the way of the visitors. He bulged the net three times in the first two periods.

It was "Babe" Dye who got the fans on their feet, however. His stick handling and accurate shooting gave his team an edge all the way and he equalled Riley's record of three scores before the final gong. Cameron also starred for the visitors, with Roach as usual, conspicuous in Toronto's goal. The teams were out to score and shots came so thick and fast that the score does not indicate the quality of the goal keeping.

NEW YORK, Dec 9—Georges Carpentier and his manager, Francois Descamps, and Battling Siki and his manager, M. Hellers, will be permanently barred from operating under the jurisdiction of the state athletic commission here if the charges of alleged collusion in the recent Carpentier-Siki bout are sustained. Chairman William Muldoon of the commission, made this statement today in discussing the cabled dispatches of the campaign in behalf of Siki, who now is under a suspension of nine months by the French Boxing Federation.

The fact that the parties entered into a conspiracy, if such is proved will make all four equally culpable, Muldoon said. He added that if there is truth in the allegations contained in Siki's account of the conditions surrounding the Senegalese boxer's bout against Carpentier, there is no room for either Carpentier or Siki, or the respective managers of the two boxers in New York boxing circles.

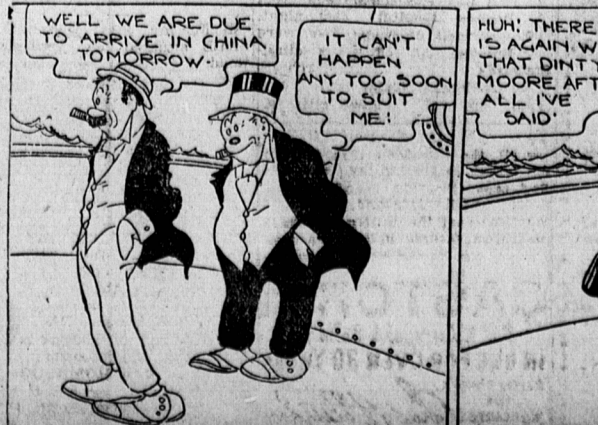

Billiard Tournament

There was no high breaks made but each player played a good steady game. Nicholson won the first game by 41 points. Redmond took the second game by 41 points and Nicholson after a closely played game won the third and final game by 3 points.

The game tonight between Bill Nicholson and Wallie Henderson starts at 7 p. m.

Laurie Jackson Breaks Another Mark

ST. JOHN'S, Nfld., Dec 10—Laurie Jackson, Halifax, distance runner, has certainly proved himself a champion. Within four days he established two new Newfoundland records. His late feat was the winning of the one and five mile events here tonight in the Newfoundland indoor championship.

He negotiated the five miles in 28 minutes, 37 and 25 seconds, beating the mark hung up by O'Toole by 20 seconds.

Jackson not only won the five mile event in fast time, but he also went out and captured the one mile run in 4:55 and 45, beating the best locals. His brother Stanton Jackson, who came here as his trainer, won the 440 yards in 52 seconds, which is fast time for an indoor race on boards, but he had little trouble in outstripping the locals.

Jackson, who is only a youth, made a wonderful impression on local sports and his departure with his brother on Sunday will be regretted. Both will be always welcome in the Old Colony.
