CUSTOMS officer James F. Curtis of this city received the sad announcement by telegraph on Sunday that his eldest son Capt. J. Fred Curtis had passed away from life's activities in the Montreal General Hospital. The deceased who was first officer of the S. S. Iberian of the Leyland Line had entered the hospital while suffering from typhoid fever. He had apparently progressed far toward recovery, and expected to be able to leave the hospital yesterday. His parents had learned this and also that he intended coming at once to Charlottetown and paying them a visit while recuperating his strength and vigor. It was while indulging these pleasant hopes that his parents, relatives and friends were doomed to the saddest of disappointments.

On Sunday afternoon Mr. Curtis received a telegram stating that in the morning, just as his son was leaving the hospital, heart failure had occurred causing instant death. The news came as an overpowering shock, and the sympathy felt for the bereaved parents, brothers and sister must be sincere and heartfelt. The deceased was cut off in his prime, being but thirty-four years of age. From early youth when only fifteen years of age he had followed the sea, and had grown to stalwart manhood in the service. For a year and a half past he had been with the Leyland Line, and some six months ago received his promotion to the Iberian. He was at home for a short time before joining his ship. The surviving near relatives are the father and mother, residing here, one sister, Mrs. Charles Prowse of Boston, and three brothers, William M. of Boston, John of San Francisco and Charles at home. William, who is a druggist in Boston left for Montreal on receipt of the sad news and will bring home the remains of the deceased for interment here.

A SUIT brought on by Maurice McGrath of Norway, Lot 1, against Martin Doyle of the same place for shooting with intent to kill tried before Magistrate Rogers and Morris, Summerside and which has occupied the attention of the Court for several days was concluded yesterday, judgment being that the suit be dismissed on the ground that there was insufficient evidence to put the defendant on his trial in the Supreme Court. A case against Peter Doyle charged by Maurice McGrath for counselling Martin A. Doyle to shoot with intent to kill tried before the same magistrates was also dismissed. A. C. Saunders for defendants, Neil McQuarrie K. C. for the prosecution. It appears that a meeting of the rate payers of Norway School District held in June last, at which time the defendant Martin A. Doyle was secretary, was irregularly held and a second meeting was called by Superintendent Anderson. To this second meeting it seems that the McGraths were opposed. When the day of the meeting arrived Mr. Doyle went to the school house and finding the doors locked attempted to gain entrance through a window. While doing so he was accosted by the McGraths. Doyle warned his assailants to stand back, but they refused and he drew a revolver and fired, as he claimed, in the air. His reason for having the weapon in his possession he gives as being because of his having heard threats that he would have trouble if he attempted to hold the meeting. By the evidence it was also shown that the revolver contained but one bullet which Doyle claimed was only intended to frighten his assailants.

THE funeral of the late William A. Poole Esq., of Lower Montague took place from his late residence at 2.30 Sunday afternoon. It was one of the largest funeral corteges ever seen in the eastern part of the province, over two hundred carriages following the remains to their last resting place. The pall-bearers were Messrs John Robertson, "Tremont," William Dauncey, George Peters, Geo. B. Aitken, David McLure and Joseph Fairchild. The services at the home and at the Methodist church were most impressive, and were conducted by the Rev. Mr. Watson and Rev. D. B. McLeod. The late Mr. Poole was born in Lower Montague in 1831. He was the third member of a family of ten, seven of whom survive him, viz., L. M. Poole of this city, James, John, Cornelius and Charles of Montague, Mrs. John McLean and Mrs. John Annear of Lower Montague. After being engaged in farming for some time Mr. Poole turned his attention to mercantile affairs about twenty-five years ago and laid the foundation of the present large and prosperous firm of W. A. Poole & Co. His son George A. became associated with him in business about sixteen years ago. In 1891, he was returned as a member of the Legislative Council, and he continued to be a highly respected member of that body until its amalgamation with the House of Assembly in 1893. But his talents were for business rather than for politics and in recent years he had not been active in public affairs. About two years ago he was attacked by the fatal Bright's disease and his health gradually declined until he passed away as announced some days ago. The Guardian extends heartfelt sympathy.
