—MEMORIAL.—The monument to be erected in St. Eleanora in memory of the nine soldiers of St. Eleanora who lost their lives while on active service, has arrived in Summerside from Toronto and is being erected on the plot of land secured for the purpose on the corner of North St. Eleanora and Town Roads. The monument is of gray granite, 9 feet high and weighs 4 tons. The base is 4 feet square the pillar tapering gradually to the top. Only one side is glazed and near the top is carved a maple leaf in the centre of which is written "To Our Fallen Heroes 1914-18." Below the maple leaf is a Union Jack and in the flag are the names of the nine men of whom this monument is in memory of viz: James V. Bryenton, John W. Clark, E. Francis Goldthwait, E. Pope Howatt, Roy Ireland, Reginald C. Jeffrey, Archie McM. Lafargey, J. Fynglain McCormack, Arthur B. Thomas. A formal unveiling of the monument will take place in the spring.—L.
