Opening of S' Side Seed Fair

The 15th annual Provincial Seed Fair was formally opened in the Agricultural Hall, Summerside on Wednesday, noon by Hon. Murdock MacKinnon, Commissioner of Agriculture, in lieu of the Lieutenant Governor.

The weather was fine and a large number of out-of-town persons took advantage of the very good sleighing and drove to the town, a large number also arriving by trains from east and west.

The exhibits though not so numerous as last year, were much better in quality. A war prize list took the place of the usual showing of fancy work, the exhibits being bread of different kinds, made from rye and other wheat flour substitutes.

This class was well represented, Miss Sterns, of Charlottetown being judge of the department. The judges for classes A, B, and C were: Prof. J. A. Clark, Experimental Farm, J. B. Andrew, Prof. J. L. Tennant, D. B. MacDonald and Prof. Paul Murphy.

An educational meeting for women was held in the Agricultural Hall in the afternoon, Hon. Murdock MacKinnon, chairman.

Miss Sterns spoke on the necessity of food conservation and Mr. Tennant on vegetable gardening.

Both addresses were very interesting and instructive. Miss Gwiazda favored the audience with a solo.

A discussion was held last night by a number of the Island's leading agriculturalists on potatoes and wheat of cultivation which was most instructive and interesting.

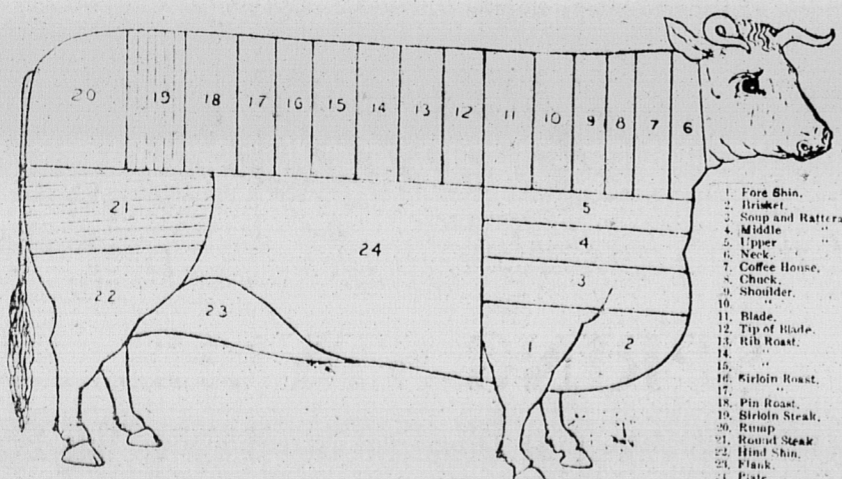

JOHN A. TURNER.

The funeral of John A. Turner was held at the Holy Rosary pro-cathedral, Vancouver, Feb. 25, at 9.30, requiem mass being celebrated by Father Thayer, interment was in the family plot, Mountain View Cemetery. Mr. Turner was a pioneer of Vancouver and much respected for his many sterling qualities. He passed peacefully away at St. Paul's Hospital Feb. 22. His sister, Mrs. Nettie M. Connally, and cousin, Mr. W. E. Hogan, D. S. A., Victoria, were at his bedside when the end came. He leaves to mourn their loss his father, James Turner, Hope River, P. E. I., three brothers, G. A., Fall River, Mass.; J. E. and W. D. at home; also five sisters, Mrs. C. F. Trainor, Mrs. E. S. Barlow, both of Fall River, Mass.; Mrs. L. E. Reid, Mrs. J. T. Quinn at home, and Mrs. Nettie M. Connally of Vancouver.

HUGH M. GUNN.

The death of Hugh M. Gunn, Bradalbane on the 6th inst removed one who will be much missed in this section of the country. Mr. Gunn was sick only a few days with that much dreaded disease, pneumonia. In spite of all that medical skill could do, it could not ward off the inevitable, and the end came as above stated. He was a man who by his many sterling qualities endeared himself to all who knew him, and his sudden demise in

middle life has brought much sorrow to a host of friends. He leaves to mourn a widow and one little daughter, also his mother, two brothers, and four sisters and a large circle of friends to cherish his memory. The late Mr. Gunn took an active interest in all matters for the advancement of the community, being on the Managing Board of the Bradalbane Presbyterian congregation. He fulfilled the duties of his office faithfully. He was also an active member of Calvin L. O. L. No. 1127 being Past Master of that Lodge. He was also one of the most progressive farmers of this section of the country. The funeral which was held from his late residence was largely attended, the Rev. Mr. Goodwill of Kensington conducted the funeral services, assisted by the Rev. Donald McLean of Charlottetown. The funeral was in charge of the Orange Order which was largely attended by his own and sister Lodges. His remains were laid to rest in Granville Cemetery. The pall bearers were: R. Nicholson, J. Falconer, H. Keir, D. W. McDonald, J. J. Brown, and Angus Gillis.

MR. JOHN HARVEY

Entered into rest at the P. E. Island Hospital, on March 15th. Mr. John Harvey, a highly respected citizen of Cape Traverse, at the age of sixty-seven, after an illness of nearly a year. The funeral which took place from his home at Cape Traverse on Tuesday, March 19th was very largely at-

tended, over a hundred sleighs being in attendance. A short service was held at the house conducted by the Rev. J. S. MacKay, and the remains were then forwarded to the Presbyterian Church, Tryon, of which Mr. Harvey was an elder for a number of years. A service was held in the church at the conclusion of which the procession adjourned to the cemetery where all that was mortal of a loving father and husband was laid to rest. The pall bearers were: Alex. Morrison, Arnold LeFurgey, William Deegan, Frank Howatt, William Bell and David MacKay.
