Annual Convention Of Christian Churches

The Annual Convention of the Churches of Christ on P. E. I., concluded its greatest assembly in years at New Glasgow on Sunday night and made plans for its greatest year. Several noted speakers from the States and Toronto gave addresses and many of the Island ministers and laymen. Major Leonard MacKay was re-elected Pres. and Miss Bertie Stewart Secy. Evangelism was the theme of the Convention throughout and the report of Dr. R. F. Whiston, the Island Evangelist, involved several forward steps for the extension of the work of the Church on P. E. I. 80 additions to the churches were reported since March first and a surplus in the treasury of the Missionary Fund.

The Women's Society elected Mrs. Preston Campbell of New Glasgow as Pres., Mrs. Leith Wright, Secy., and Mrs. Maynard of Summerside Regional Director. The Society voted to withdraw from the Maritime Provinces Mission Society and maintain their own unit, reporting to the National Society direct from the Island. The Convention sermon was delivered by Rev. Wilfred Outhouse of Charlottetown. He stated this was an age of spiritual vagrancy intermittent Christian living and spasmodic consecration, hence "the Church of today must exercise all of its functions and become not only a House of worship but a Sanctuary as well." He also said that there must be "not only a doctrinal unity but a philanthropic and service unity."

The highest point in the Convention was the address of Dr. Hugh B. Kilgour of Toronto, Secy. of the All Canada Board. He spoke on the "spirit-filled life" drawing his lesson from the life and character of Christ. He stated that "There is a life that is spirit-filled, Jesus exemplified it, the Apostles extolled it, and it may

They were bringing blacks from the Guinea coast. Faugh! A sweet-smelling ship for the ladies!" "And they are ladies!" cried Jules. "I see one in black who walks like a queen. Wives for some of us. First come, first served!"

And with that he leaped ahead of them and raced up the boat in his haste to present Basile with a step-mother.

It was not until clear of the Maire, which the immigrants seemed to shun that I sensed the confusion of the scene and observed the amazement and despair of the newcomers. A sergeant, tanned as dark as a Guinea black, was unusually active in pulling and pushing the immigrants about. In disgust I watched this fellow, his dirty paws making too free with the women, and then had my ire aroused by beholding him seize a woman in black by the arm—the one Mattor said walked like a queen—and give her a spin that sent her reeling across the sand to fall at my feet.

He crouched for a spring, his eyes glaring like a tree-toad, and I was ready for him, when to my surprise the rage died out of his face. His dark countenance began twisting up like old parchment.
