Red Wings Defeat Bruins -2 To Take Section Lead; Rangers And Leafs Lose

(C. P. by Guardian's Special Wire)

DETROIT, Jan. 10—Detroit Red Wings, still holding their season-long lead over Boston, turned back the Bruins again tonight 4-2 as the Boston team fought vainly for their first win of the National Hockey League season against the champions.

Syd Howe, combining with Ebbie Goodfellow in some neat passing, broke a 1-1 tie at 19:54 of the second period, and the Red Wings stretched the lead to three goals before Bill Cowley former Halifax Wolverine, finally lifted the puck past Boston's Smith at 8:41 of the third for Boston's second goal. Cowley's was a short shot over Smith's prostrate form after the goalie dived to save Ray Gettiffe's shot.

Moderne Bruneteau fired Detroit's third goal 52 seconds after the third period opened and Marty Barry the fourth, a difficult angle shot from left wing on a pass from Herbie Lewis. The biggest crowd of the season at Olympia, 13,498 fans, cheered as the Detroit players broke up the Bruin attack in the final minutes.

Only one penalty was called that on Pee Kelly for tripping.

MAROONS 5-RANGERS 2

NEW YORK, Jan. 10—New York Rangers dropped back into second place in National Hockey League sectional standing tonight as they lost 5-2 to Montreal Maroons while Detroit Red Wings were beating Boston Bruins to break the two-way tie.

Before 12,000 fans, Maroons scored twice in the opening period, slipped in the second as Rangers got both their tallies, and then put on the pressure in the last session for three goals.

The victory consolidated the Montrealers in second place in the league's Canadian section. It also marked the first time in 11 scheduled games that Maroons had been able to defeat the Gotham blue shirts.

The Montrealers started tonight's game at a swift clip, Jerry Shannon scoring twice in 12 minutes on clever combination thrusts.

Lester Patrick's men rallied though in the second period, and the score was tied as Cecil Dillon and Bill Cook beat fireman Alex

Connell in the Maroon net.

Maroon's big break came early in the third, when Jimmy Ward hoisted a long shot at the New York cage. Veteran Ching Johnson, trying to clear, rapped the puck right into his own net to send the visitors ahead.

Though Rangers threw defensive tactics away after that in an attempt to even up, Maroons broke away twice more for goals by Earl Robinson and Baldy Northcott.

HAWKS 2-LEAFS 1

CHICAGO, Jan. 10—Chicago's Black Hawks, scoring one goal with two opposing players in the penalty box and catching in on their opponent's over-anxiety for a second, trimmed the Toronto Maple Leafs 2 to 1, in a fast National Hockey League battle tonight.

Thirteen thousands fans saw the well-played battle, in which the work of the two goalies, Mike Karakas of the Hawks and Walter Broda of the Leafs, was outstanding.

Jimmy Fowler and Nick Metz of Toronto were serving penalties for tripping when Louis Trudell scored the opening goal midway in the first period, flapping the disc home on Paul Thompson's rebound. In the second period, with the Leafs far down the ice, furiously trying to tie the score Thompson broke away alone after a short pass from Trudell and beat Broda with a low, hard shot.

Reggie Hamilton saved the Leafs from a shutout by taking a pass from Davidson and slashing the puck into the twine early in the final period. There were but seven penalties assessed, five against the visitors. It was Chicago's fifth win in 22 league starts this season.

Leafs Eke Out Victory Over Canadiens, 2-1

TORONTO, Jan. 10—Harvey Jackson's third period shot, backhanded through a cluster of players, gave Toronto Maple Leafs a 2-1 win over Montreal Canadiens Saturday night in the most pulse-quickening game of National League hockey Toronto has seen this season.

Persistent attacking won the game for Leafs, overcoming the advantage Canadiens had in speed and polished passing. Conny Smythe's team turned on the heat from the first faceoff and kept peppering Wilf Cude with shots despite the close backchecking of the Habitants.

Canadiens' goal came in the first period, George Mantha scoring from a pileup around the Leaf goal. Bill Thoms, Toronto centre, tied the game up early in the second, hitting the puck past Cude from just outside the crease after taking Bill Kendall's pass.

Cude had no chance at all to save on Jackson's winning goal. It's doubtful the Canadian net-minder even saw it coming. His view was obstructed by half a dozen players as Jackson snapped up Sylvanus Apps' pass and drove a left backhand from about 15 feet out.

There were 12 penalties called, nine of them packed in a rough second period. Red Hoyer, Toronto defenceman, got three minors for rough play and referee Babe Dye tacked on a 10-minute misconduct penalty when the red head argued about it.

Proposed Heavyweight Fight Boycott Gains Momentum; German Press Indignant

NEW YORK, Jan. 10—(AP)—

Boycott of the James J. Braddock-Max Schmeling heavyweight championship fight picked up momentum today.

Jewish War Veterans of the United States, 250,000 strong, threw their support to the non-sectarian anti-Nazi League, the A. P. of L. and various Catholic and Protestant organizations seeking to stop the fight from being held in this country.

Harry H. Schaffer, commander-in-chief of the veterans, announced here he is notifying the 150 posts throughout the country to withhold support from the fight.

The boycott was launched by the anti-Nazi League as part of its program to oppose German goods, shipping and services.

Although Madison Square Garden and the 20th Century Sporting Club joint promoters of the fight, continued to withhold comment, belief was general a long Broadway that the battle is doomed.

BERLIN, Jan. 10—(AP)—Appeals to United States, 5-7-play came from Max Schmeling today when news of a movement to boycott the forthcoming heavyweight championship fight between Schmeling and Jimmy Braddock reached Germany.

"I believe the American public is too far to be influenced by a political campaign against a sportsman like me who never went in for politics," Schmeling said.

German papers universally greeted news of the boycott with indignation. "Schmeling hekkled in unbelievable way by U. S. A. Jews," was the way the newspaper Angriff headlined its front page.

Angriff termed the boycott movement "crazy and malicious."

Bonspiel At Curling Rink Postponed

Old man weather who seems to take an imish delight in upsetting the general scheme of things this year went so far as to score a technical K. O. over the curlers in their scheduled inaugural "bonspiel" Saturday afternoon. As a result of the mild weather the ice was heavy and the schedule was dropped with but a few exhibition matches being played. On a whole however, an enjoyable get-together was held with supper at 6 o'clock.

On Friday evening club-members, a number equipped with new "rocks," were poised for the annual East vs. West competition but the weather which has been everything but conducive to good curling turned suddenly mild to cause postponement of the bonspiel. Curlers are somewhat worried that the seasons activities will be curtailed by the lack of ice, but express hope that the schedule will proceed uninterrupted by next week.

Curlers are reminded that teams wishing to compete in the British Consols team trophy elimination matches must forward their entries to Umpire George W. MacLeod on or before Tuesday, January 12th. The Championship matches are scheduled for the first of February so the clubs haven't so very much time to select the rinks that will represent them in the provincial championships. Boucher Gives Rangers Win Over Maroons

MONTREAL, Jan. 10—Frankie Boucher, veteran centreman, gave New York Rangers a 3-2 victory against Montreal Maroons Saturday night, flipping the winning goal by Alex Connell in the waning minutes of the game.

Boucher's tally made it 10 straight games without defeat for Rangers against the Montreal team. During that time Rangers won six and drew four.

Maroons gave a crowd of slightly more than 7,000 cause for cheer by going into a goal lead in the first period but the Colville brothers, Neil and Mac, sent Rangers a goal ahead in the second period. Maroons tied it up in the third only to see Boucher's goal spell defeat.

Bob Gracie was first to find the scoring range when he walked in on goalie Dave Kerr after taking a double relay from Cy Wentworth and Jerry Shannon.

Neil Colville evened matters soon after the start of the second period. A face-off in the Maroon defensive zone allowed Rangers to score their second goal. Neil Colville got the draw, passed over to his right and brother Mac put the puck away.

Earl Robinson evened the score at 2-2 in the third period after taking Russ Blinco's pass-out from corner.

Jimmy Ward and Phil Watson were in the penalty box for a minor tiff when Boucher came through with the winning goal.

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Fred Perry Again Wins From Vines Weust Shatters 100 Metre Dash Indoor Record

NEW YORK, Jan. 10—(AP)—An "unknown" sprinter, Herb Weust, Columbia sophomore, stole the show from a flock of Olympic stars at the Columbus Council, Knights of Columbus, games here by shattering the world indoor 100 metre dash record.

Weust sped over the boards of the 106th Infantry Armory last night in 10.6 seconds in the final race of the sprint series. The accepted indoor record of 10.8 was set by Bob McAllister in 1927 and equalled three years later by Karl Wildermuth.

This feat overshadowed the better-than-average times of Glenn Cunningham, in beating his old rival Gene Venke in the 800-metre feature and of Indiana's Don Lash in the 3,000 metre event.

Cunningham, starting another campaign for recognition as the foremost middle-distance runner of the United States, turned back the bid of Venke for the third straight year.

Letting loose with his blazing drive in the last 100 metres, the burly Kansan, world record holder at half mile and mile outdoors, first passed Venke and then Bill Ray of Manhattan as he drove to victory by six-meters in 1:56.4.

Slow foot and apparently too weary to run much, he dropped the first set in jig-time.

Vines made his best effort of the evening in the final set. After Perry had romped through the first two games, Vines hauled himself together and won three games in a row to have the edge for the only time of the match.

Perry, after a wobbly start in the sixth game, again took charge and finished the match quickly. Perry and Lotz defeated Vines and Barnes 6-3, 6-2, in the doubles.
