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Ray Getliffe Scores Three Goals As Bruins Defeat Maroons In Opener 4-2

MONTREAL, Nov. 7 (CP)—Boston Bruins, who finished second to Detroit Red Wings in their section of the National Hockey League last winter, have developed new strength with the return to health of Eddie Shore and the addition of a brilliant young forward line in Milt Schmidt, Bobby Bauer and Porky Dumart.

Beating Montreal Maroons 4-2 in the season's opener here last night, Bruins displayed the power which may take them serious contenders for the Wings' sectional and league championships.

Ray Getliffe, blond opportunist who formerly played in Saint John and Charlottetown, scored three Boston goals and Schmidt got the other with Dumart's aid. Shore looked like the Shre who used to make everyone's all-star team.

The Boston team, opening Maroons' schedule for the third straight year, went ahead in the first minute of the first period and after that let Montreal carry the play in a bustling, bruising encounter the 7,000 spectators enjoyed.

King Clancy's debut as Maroon coach didn't bring a victory but it did fulfill his promise to be a fighting club and the fans relished the home team's willingness to battle back and trade bumps.

Signed less than 24 hours before the game, young Des Smith, former amateur, was aggressive in his first professional start on the Montreal defence.

Cook put Maroons ahead on their first dangerous foray when he banged in Jimmy Ward's pass after five minutes. Six minutes later Getliffe batted home Cowley's pass on a play started by Clapper, who also gave the pass for Getliffe's second goal in the last minute of the period.

Getliffe's third goal came three minutes after the start of the middle period but Ward cut the margin two minutes later on a snapshot that followed Robinson's pass in front of the net.

Flash Hollett broke with Schmidt and Dumart for a four-man Maroon offensive in the last period and they pulled the lone defenceman far to one side to let Schmidt go in for the last goal.

The Red Wings had a rare chance with seven minutes to play when Joe Cooper and Ott Heller were caught holding at the same time, leaving the Rangers two men short for two minutes, but the New Yorkers gave goalie Dave Kerr plenty of help and he kicked aside every shot produced by Detroit's power plays.
