Against the Chancellor. Morocco—Congo Agreement Very Unpopular

BERLIN, Nov. 10—(By wire)—The attitude of the Crown Prince Frederick William during the debate in the Reichstag when he openly demonstrated his pleasure over and approval of the criticisms of Chancellor Hollweg's policy in the Moroccan affair with France, and applauded fiery speeches, is sharply condemned by not only the friends but the opponents of the Chancellor.

The Berlin papers join in describing the incident as a frivolous and dangerous exhibition and express the fear that impression has been given abroad that the future Emperor is heading a German war party.

This stand by the press may result in strengthening the position of the Chancellor, which was badly shaken when the pent-up fury, born of the popular feeling that Germany had backed down before a British menace, was vented in the Reichstag.

The response of the House was a broadside by the leaders of the Conservatives, Liberals and Socialists who attacked the Moroccan-Congo agreement as humiliating and approved the action of the Secretary for the Colonies, Dr. Von Lindde, who resigned in protest.

FOY'S PARTNER MADE HIGH COURT JUDGE

OTTAWA, Nov. 9—An order-in-council has been passed appointing Hugh T. Kelly, K. C., of Toronto, a law partner of Hon. J. J. Foy, to the position on the Ontario High Court Bench rendered vacant by the death of Justice McMahon last spring.
