St. Joseph's church was the scene of a smart, mid-summer wedding of much charm at 11.30 o'clock this morning, of Eileen, daughter of Mr. W. L. Scott, K. C., and Mrs. Scott granddaughter of the late Sir Richard Scott, of Ottawa, and granddaughter of the late Sir William Sullivan, Chief Justice of Prince Edward Island to Charles Doherty Mulvey, son of Mr. Thomas Mulvey, Under Secretary of State, and Mrs. Mulvey O. M. I., performed the ceremony.

The church was beautifully adorned with gladioli and coreopsis in tones of soft yellow, and deep blue delphinium and gypsophylls marked the guest pews and the chancel steps were banked with cibotum ferns. The altar was lovely with yellow blossoms. Miss Dora Villeneuve presided at the organ, and played softly through the service. During the signing of the register she rendered "Caprice Heroique" by Bonnet, very effectively.

The bride, who is one of the most popular of the Capital's younger set, was a debutante of last year. She was abroad for a year at school, prior to her coming out. She was given in marriage by her father and was attended by five charming bridesmaids, the Misses Alice Peck, Julia MacBrien, Mary Blackburn, Odette LaPointe and Barbara Greene, all of Ottawa. Mr. John Mulvey, brother of the bridegroom was best man and acting ushers were Mr. Cuthbert Scott, Mr. Meredith Jarvis, Mr. Brittan Osler, Toronto, and Mr. B. Ryckman, Toronto.

An exquisitely modelled wedding gown of deep cream satin was worn by this radiantly pretty bride. It was designed with long close fitting sleeves with small effective tucking. Her long tulle train was of the same material and fell in graceful lines from the waistline. The bride wore a filmy veil of embroidered net belonging to her mother, in a close-fitting, caplike effect, caught with a cluster of orange blossoms at one side. These also belonged to the bride's mother, she carried a dainty shower bouquet of pale yellow roses and lily-of-the-valley. Her only ornament was a handsome necklace of pearls.

The attendants were gowned alike in pretty pale yellow georgette frocks, daintily designed, and they wore large hats of yellow baku straw to match. They carried arm bouquets of pale yellow roses and blue delphinium.

Mrs. Scott, mother of the bride wore a charming gown of georgette in lapis lazuli shade with a baku straw hat to match, and wore a shoulder knot or pansies and lily-of-the-valley.

MONCTON, July 9.—The third general meeting of the System Recreation Council of the Canadian National Reception League opened here yesterday afternoon with representatives from as far west as Edmonton, Alta.

W. U. Appleton, general manager Atlantic Region Canadian National Railways, in addressing the meeting spoke of the place recreation has in modern business and stated that the older he grows the more he realizes the value of recreation and athletics in business.

A healthy body is a vital asset to any person and it is of paramount importance in the industrial sphere. Clear minds and healthy bodies are demanded in business today and anything that will develop this is worthy of support.

F. M. Tompkins, Traffic Manager, spoke of the value of the recreation league to the railways from a traffic standpoint and assured the representatives of his support in their deliberations and activities.

For The Cook

CINNAMON CAKE

1 cup of white sugar.
1/4 cup shortening.
1 egg.
1/2 cup sour milk.
1/2 teaspoon soda.
1 1/2 cups of fine pastry flour.
1/2 teaspoon salt.
1/2 teaspoon cinnamon.
2 level teaspoons of baking powder.
Cream the sugar and shortening. Add the beaten egg, then the sour milk in which the soda is dissolved. Add the flour sifted with the salt, baking powder and cinnamon. Pour into a greased pan. Bake in a moderate oven until the cake leaves the sides of the pan.
This may be iced by mixing icing sugar, melted chocolate, a little milk, vanilla and salt, or it is quite nice eaten plain.
