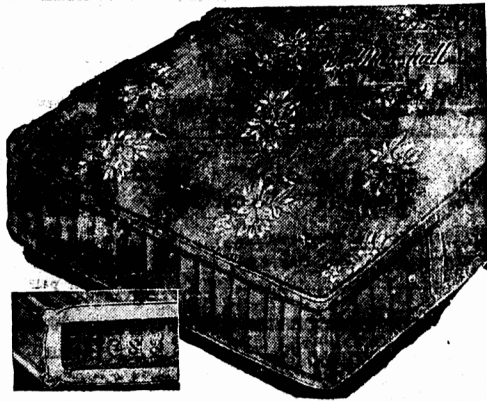

Annual Meeting

—During the year there were nine regular meetings and two executive meetings, with always a good attendance.

There is a paid-up membership of fifty-two. Two of the members attended the Diocesan Convention held at Charlottetown last August. Mrs. Eugene Perry was the voting delegate.

During the year six Masses were celebrated, one was said on Remembrance Day for the boys who made the supreme sacrifice in the two World Wars, another for Reverend Father MacDougall, who labored for years in Tignish parish, and the others for our deceased members.

At Easter time flowers were purchased for the altar; money for the flowers was solicited throughout the district by members of the League, and during the summer months the altar was frequently adorned with flowers from the members' gardens. This arranging of flowers, as well as helping with the cleaning of the sanctuary each month, was done by the church convener, Mrs. Octave Gaudet, and her committee. Those ladies were also very active in regard to sewing of church linen and were congratulated by Reverend J. A. MacDonald for the beautiful work they done. All altar linens were hand sewn and several of the altar cloths had hemstitching and hand-made lace. A web of linen was completely finished up into beautiful work, besides a goodly number of other pieces made from linen left from last year. Repair work was done on vestments and other church robes. There was a sanctuary fund apart from the regular fund and from those funds was purchased the web of linen already mentioned, black vestments, a statue of the Infant Jesus for the Christmas Crib, vigil light glasses, a carpet sweeper and several other small articles.

Donations were made to the St. Dunstan's Girls' Scholarship Fund, Sisters of Service, Sisters of the Precious Blood, St. Martha's building fund, T. B. League, Tignish War Memorial, school prizes, and to local boys attending seminaries in Central Canada.

Three boxes of used clothing were donated by the members, packed by the Social Service convener, Mrs. Foster Skerry, and her committee, and sent to St. Vincent's Orphanage, as well as a large carton of new articles of wearing apparel, toys and candy sent at Christmas to help make little hearts happy. This committee did knitting and sewing for the Red Cross, as well as giving aid on a number of occasions to needy persons in our locality.

The education convener, Mrs. Wilfred Shea and her committee made a number of visits to the class-rooms of Our Lady of the Angels Convent and Dalton school and besides the prizes donated by the League for the year closing in June, an individual prize was presented by each member. A treat for Sisters and pupils was provided at Christmas.

The sick committee with Mrs. Milton Keough as convener, did splendid work in visiting the sick bringing their treats and sending out messages of good cheer.

Two lots of cancelled stamps were sent to St. Alphonsus Seminary, Woodstock, Ontario. The work of collecting the stamps was taken care of by Mrs. Michael McPhee.

The entertainment committee under the convener of Mrs. Joseph T. Arseneault raised the money to care for all the sub-division expenses by running card parties in several of the members' homes, pantry sales and a lottery. All social functions were very successful, which was due to the capable manner in which they were run. The sub-division mourns the loss of two beloved and loyal members, Mrs. Urbain Gaudet and Mrs. Albert Greenan, whose deaths occurred during the past summer. Seven League magazines are received.
