### IRISH PARLIAMENT PASSES DECREES ESTABLISHING CRIMINAL COURTS.

DUBLIN, July 4.—It became widely known today that the "Irish Parliament" was in secret session here Tuesday and Wednesday, and that decrees were passed authorizing the establishment of courts of justice and equity, and courts of Land Jurisdiction, and a National Land Commission, and provides for the protection of persons occupying land against vexatious claims.

It was announced that the million dollar international loan had been over-subscribed by \$250,000 when the loan closed.

The following message was sent to Eamon de Valera, "President of the Irish Republic":

"The De. Leirann, assembled in full session at Dublin today, unanimously reaffirms the allegiance of the citizens of Ireland to your policy, expresses complete satisfaction with the work you have performed and relies with confidence upon the great American nation to accord recognition to the Republic of Ireland, how in fact and law established."

### DEAR BANANAS.

Nine cars loaded with bananas and a car of feed fruits arrived here on Saturday the 3rd. Three of the nine cars of bananas are for the city, one for Moncton, one for New Glasgow, two for Sydney, and two for Halifax. The price of bananas advanced in Cuba to 25 cents a bunch, as compared with 23 cents a bunch a year ago. Further it is stated that the bananas are not as large as formerly. Strong competition between two large American banana exporters, it is stated, has resulted in West Indian growers obtaining abnormally high prices. The natives, in order to supply the demand, are not waiting until the fruit is full grown to dispose of their crops. A new company, financed by capitalists headed by the railroad king, is backing the United Fruit Company in an endeavor to get command of the West Indian markets.
