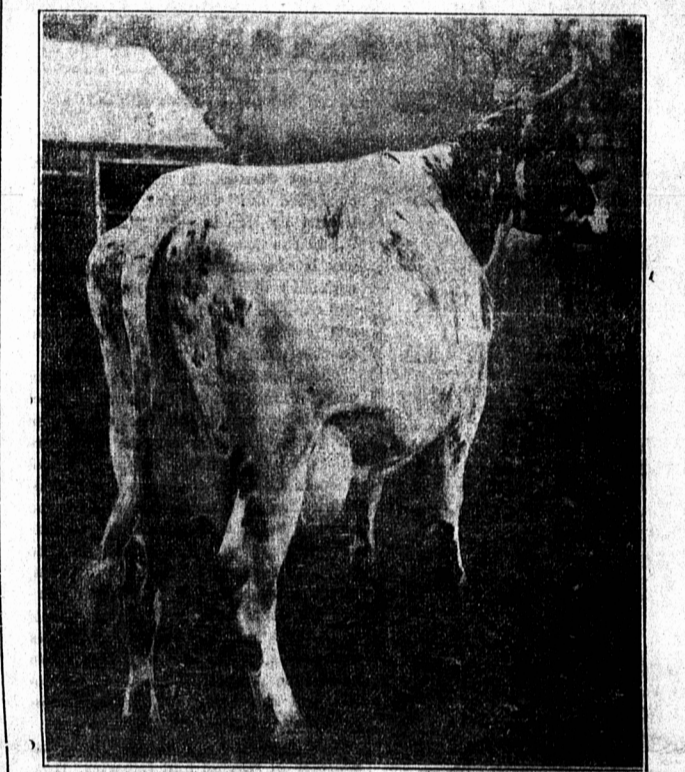

GERMAN DECLARES RELATIONS GOOD

(Canadian Press) BERLIN, Feb. 4.—The Anglo-German relations are very good, said Foreign Minister, Von Jagow, in a speech today. This is the strongest official characterization of the relations of the two countries that has been given in years. He said the tension was steadily decreasing and that the relations were now marked by a Mutual Trust. The Minister of Marine said the 16 to 10 fleet rate, proposed by England, was satisfactory but a year's naval ship building holiday was unpracticable.

CANADIAN OFFICES

THE WEATHER, THE TEMPERATURE, TIDE, MOON, ETC.

The tide will be high this afternoon at 4.57 and tomorrow morning at 7.23 and Saturday at 8.36. The sun sets this afternoon at 5.12 and tomorrow at 5.14; it rises tomorrow 7.16 and Saturday at 7.15. The moon sets tomorrow morning at 4.29. The first quarter of the moon was on Thursday, Feb. 3rd, at 6.33 a. m. The moon will be full Tuesday, Feb. 10th at 1.35 a. m. The length of today will be nine hours and fifty-five minutes. (Special to The Guardian) TORONTO, Feb. 5.—Fresh north-west to north winds; fair and becoming much colder. Yesterday's weather was quite variable; beginning with a heavy snowfall in the morning, followed by a downpour of rain early in the afternoon, the rain was succeeded by slightly foggy conditions, and the day ended by clearing up and freezing. The highest temperature recorded yesterday was 37 degrees above zero, being five degrees more than the lowest temperature recorded the previous night. At 9 a. m. yesterday it was 32 degrees above; at 9 p. m., 36 degrees above.

AVOID SUFFRAGETTES

(Canadian Press.) GLASGOW, Feb. 4.—Lloyd George is here to speak today on the Land Campaign. Apparently to avoid the Suffragettes. He had his train stopped six miles out and came to the City in an automobile. The election will take place by ballot and the names of the candidates will appear on the ballots in the order given above. The returning officer will open the polls on Wednesday, February 11, in twelve divisions in Charlottetown in pursuance of the warrant of election which was issued to him after the nomination proceeded yesterday afternoon. A deputy returning officer and a poll clerk will be appointed for each of these polling divisions. In Ward 1 two polls will be opened, one East and one West of Great George Street. In Ward 2 there will also be two polls, one East and one West of Great George Street. Ward 3 will have only one poll, and that will be held in the Market House.
