GOVERNMENT OWNERSHIP.

We do not usually take much stock in what the party journals have to say for or against the Government of the day. We think however that the St. John Sun has scored a point in connexion with Government ownership and the purchase of the Canada Eastern Railway. The Government is about to construct a great railway from Moncton to Wingham and will hand it over to a company for fifty years. Their contention is that it is not advisable or desirable that they should operate this new line that they are about to construct. By what process of reasoning can it then be argued that it is advisable or desirable that the Government should buy the Canada Eastern?

The Canada Eastern, which extends from Chatham to Fredericton has not been a money-making road. Its road-bed and rolling-stock are far below the standard of the Intercolonial, and it will involve a large outlay over and above the purchase price to bring it up to the Government standard. When that is done, if a service is given on the newly purchased road which will compare in frequency and other features of trap equipment and service it will be much more likely to add to the already large deficits in the working of the Government system than to decrease them. Nor is there any known necessity for the Government purchasing this road other than a political one. The consistency of the transaction with the attitude of the Cabinet in regard to the Transcontinental Railway is not therefore apparent.

Had the Government purchased the New Brunswick and P. E. Island Railway instead of the Canada Eastern a much better defence could have been made. It would have made the Intercolonial still more worthy to bear that name by affording a highway to ward this Island, and with a ferry at the Capes would practically extend the Intercolonial to another Province in addition to the three which it now connects. But, of course, it would also be inconsistent with the theory that the Government has already too much rather than too little railway mileage on its hands. On the other side the Opposition, which is now committed to a policy of extending Gov-

ernment ownership, and would, we presume, excuse the purchase of the Saskatchewan-Tormentine road, is in a somewhat weakened position in attacking the acquisition of the Canada Eastern on general principles.

The Czar's reported to be displeased because complications have arisen over the seizure of neutral vessels. That is quite natural, Japan alone is giving him all the trouble he wants without getting up a row with Britain and Germany.

The budget of the Orange River Colony shows prosperity. The revenue for 1903-4 which had been estimated to yield \$2,815,000, actually reached \$4,305,000, or more than double that of the old Free State Government in 1898. The expenditure during the year was \$6,735,000, leaving a surplus for the year of \$680,000.

At first the doctors of the incubator establishment had little faith in their chances of rearing the little one, but yesterday afternoon Mr. Martin Conroy announced that he felt confident of saving the baby's life. According to the London Lancet no child weighing less than thirty-six ounces at birth can survive.
