EDMONTON, April 23.—More vacant jobs are waiting for men to fill them than there were a year ago, according to the report from the Government Employment Service. There were 231 vacancies at the beginning of the week, compared with 51 at the same time last year. At the moment, says Commissioner Walter S. Mitten, there are no means in sight for supplying this demand.

The shortage is in experienced men who know how western farming is done, and newly arrived immigrants lacking in experience are not in demand.
