L.P.U. Resolution On Stronger Beer

At a regular meeting of L. P. U. April 13, the following resolutions were unanimously adopted: Whereas the beer committee have not asked ready of our citizens, merchants and business men to sign our petition for stronger beer because they thought it might affect their business or welfare with the temperance people to have their names to our petition;

And whereas their present prohibition act affects the working class in many ways.

And whereas, we believe the present prohibitory law to be a violation of British fair play;

And whereas another petition from temperance people opposing stronger beer is about to be presented.

Therefore resolved, That we respectfully ask our merchants, business men and friends of the working men to remain neutral and let the question be decided by a referendum of the people by balloting.

And it was further resolved that the beer committee will use their best endeavors through the public press and otherwise to promote the question until such time as the present act is amended or a referendum of the people be taken.

Australian Casualties

(Special to The Guardian) MELBOURNE, April 13.—The total of Australian casualties during the war was 307,900, according to official figures made public today. They were divided as follows: Killed 58,035; wounded 166,606; missing 193; prisoners 428; sick 82,409; unspecified 219.

GERMANS UNABLE TO MAKE PAYMENT.

Prohibition Vote In New Zealand

(Special to The Guardian) WELLINGTON, April 12.—The vote on the question of prohibition for New Zealand stands on the returns so far received as follows: for continuance of the present license system 220,602 for prohibition 233,558. There are still a few returns and the votes of 40,000 soldiers to be received.

Guilty Turks Brought to Justice

(Special to The Guardian) CAIRO, April 12.—Turkish officials in Palestine who are guilty of atrocities during the war are being brought to justice by the British administration.

Sinn Fein Parliament Meets in Dublin

(Special to The Guardian) DUBLIN, April 12.—The Sinn Fein Parliament today discussed the League of Nations. The member of the Parliament for Monaghan attacked President Wilson and called him "The Machiavelli of the New World intent on forcing a sham League of Nations on prostrate humanity."

Sir Edward Kemp Visits St. Dunstons

(Special to The Guardian) LONDON, April 12.—Sir Edward Kemp Dominion Overseas Minister visited at St. Dunstan's Hostel for blinded soldiers yesterday. He was received by Sir Arthur Pearson. Sir Edward Kemp presented medals to Corporal Austin of the 7th Regiment, Loyal of Ontario and Private R. Malory of the Third Regiment, Medicine Hat. He also presented prizes to the Canadian blind war team which won against all other inmates of St. Dunstan's. Forty Canadians remain still at St. Dunstons.

Enriched Aliens Leaving the U.S.

(Special to The Guardian) NEW YORK, April 11.—Enriched by war work Aliens are leaving this country at the rate of more than 1,000 a day, it was learned here today from custom officials who expressed fear with the possibility that congress may limit immigration for the next four years in the United States will face a serious labor shortage instead of a condition of unemployment since the signing of the armistice it was said Italians, Greeks, Spaniards, and Portuguese have been pouring out of the United States through this port. Since November 76,121 passports have been issued at the Custom House and since December 32,000 Aliens have sailed.

Anglo Spanish Treaty Now Arranged

MADRAS, April 10.—Premier Rameswami had a conference today with the British ambassadors concerning the convention between Great Britain and Spain which will be signed tomorrow. England by this treaty will permit the importation of Spanish oranges and will ship to Spain 150,000 tons of coal per month. Spain will loan Great Britain seventy-five million pesetas, the rate of interest being five per cent.

The Allies May Evacuate Sebastopol

(Special to The Guardian) PARIS, April 12.—The advance of the Bolsheviks is likely to force the Allies to evacuate Sebastopol on the Black Sea near the southern extremity of the Crimea, according to the Intergovernmental.

A Bolshevik official despatch by wireless announces the occupation of Birgula, 115 miles northwest of Odessa, and of progress in the direction of Tarnopol and Sarvak.

In the course of a discussion in the chamber of deputies of the bill regarding war damages, Louis Klotz, the Minister of Finance, in answering the questions of deputies declared that he would bring in within a fortnight a plan for a financial organization that would enable all the devastated regions to re-establish themselves. This declaration by the Minister was cheered.

ASSESSED \$6,000 FOR KILLING A GLACE BAY BOY

(Canadian Press) SYDNEY, April 10.—Six thousand dollars damages for the death of a young boy killed by his taxi at Glace Bay last fall, were assessed against Ike Marshall at the civil term of the Supreme Court here before Mr. Justice Longley. A previous indictment for manslaughter had failed. The beneficiaries are the parents of the deceased lad who was about six years of age.

GREATER UNREST IN PALESTINE

CAIRO, April 10.—Reports received here indicate there is greater unrest in Palestine. Moslems and Christians there are aroused over reports that Palestine will be turned over to the Zionists. They are bitterly opposed to a Jewish state in Palestine and to an influx of Jews supported by American and European gold. They declare the land belongs to the inhabitants.

They invoke the principles of self-determination as founded by President Wilson.

The Syrians say they are ready to accept a reasonable Jewish immigration and to grant full religious liberty to every one. On the other hand, they protest against a partition of Syria, and declare that the country will be ruined if the Jews get Haifa (in Syria, on the bay of Ancre and at the foot of Mount Carmel), and the Armenians get Alexander (on the Gulf of Alender.) In the Cairo colony reports are being circulated of pogroms among the Jews by Moslems and Christians. They are without foundation. The British have the situation well in hand.

State of Germany

BERLIN, April 10.—Government troops are reported to have entered Essen and to have occupied the Krupp plant which, according to previous reports, had been seized by the Essen strikers. The troops posted artillery and machine guns at the entrances to the plant. The result of the intervention by the Government forces, the advices state, was that two-thirds of the workmen resumed their labor.

Favoured Nation Peace Proviso

PARIS, April 10.—Provision for the most favored nation treatment for the German customs system for the allied and associated countries and a single tariff and no-tariff discriminations based on the flag of the vessels in which goods are transported on the route of importation or exportation, will be incorporated in the peace treaty with Germany, according to the present provisional agreement. The restriction is to be enforced for five years after the conclusion of peace, and it will probably include the proviso that the tariffs in force upon imports from the associated countries during that period shall be based on the most favored nations schedules of 1914.
