LOCAL BRIEFS

Latest News of the City and Province.

MR. JAMES McHALE, of DENVER, COLORADO, is visiting relatives in this city. Mr. McHale has been twenty years in Denver and speaks in glowing terms of the West. He has also been visiting friends on P. E. Island. S. John Sun.

SYDNEY RACES for the 18th are well filled in all the classes. Minota, War, en Guy, Montrose, Provider and Israel, in the first race; Rock Farm Grace, Nancy Medium, Dolly King, Belnut and C. I. in two thirty five; and Maud, Lady Top, Darkey, Duke, Molly Bawn, and Moly Bell in two forty five. The track is in excellent condition and splendid races are assured. It is understood the same horses will enter in North Sydney. Arrangements have been made to get the horses returned from Charlottetown to Sydney Saturday night by special freight.

THE PROVINCIAL EXHIBITION.—The Great Fair at Halifax opens on Saturday the 23d. The I. C. R. will give special excursions at particularly cheap rates on Tuesday, Thursday, and Saturday, and the D. A. R. on Monday, Wednesday, and Friday. The D. A. R. \$3.00 rate from Yarmouth and returns extended over the whole week. The I. C. R. will extend a siding into the grounds for the convenience of exhibitors of sheep and swine. The latter came in earlier and had therefore to be trucked from the siding to the show pens. There are over 200 more entries for cattle than last year. The Poultry exhibit will be the largest and best that has ever been shown at any Provincial Exhibition. The birds will be better cared for and shown to greater advantage. An Indian Village will be one of the novelties of the Fair. A colony of wigwags with a lot of Miames in characteristic costumes making baskets, miniature canoes, bead work, etc., will present an interesting and picturesque scene. Sir Charles Tupper is to speak in front of the grand stand on Wednesday. On that day there will be a special excursion from Cape Breton. The massive scene for the "forming of Peiwar Kotal", the great military spectacle, has been completed and will be arranged so that it can be taken down while the trotting races are taking place, so that the people on the grand stand can have a full view of back-trotter. The squads of men to take part in the great war drama have been drilled to perfection, so that an unequalled military show is guaranteed. Balloon ascensions will be made every afternoon from the grounds by Prof. Walcott, one of the most distinguished aeronauts of America, whose contributions to popular and scientific literature are highly valued and widely read. Prof. Walcott stands in the first rank of his daring profession, and notwithstanding his many thrilling and perilous adventures, he still pursues it with dauntless spirit.

BELLEVUE FARM is becoming noted for the excellent herds of Ayrshires and Shorthorns, and the genial and bustling proprietor, Mr. C. A. Archibald, certainly deserves all the praise he gets for his efforts in this direction. Last Autumn he imported a bull and several very fine heifers direct from Scotland, coming out with a lot of Guernseys for Mr. E. R. Browe, of Charlottetown, P. E. I. They landed there, and were kept in quarantine, and later held until Spring, when they were taken to Bellevue Farm. The bull is a fine animal, and will head a splendid herd of cows when he walks out at the exhibition.—Truro News.

EASTERN NOTES.—Harvesting is general all over this section, when the weather permits, and the crop is a good one, though the rain and wind of a few days broke down and tangled the grain considerably.—Machinery is rapidly taking the place of manual labor in every department here as elsewhere, and the binder is rapidly superseding the reaper which succeeded the old munny; the cradle, the scythe and the reaping hook. The reaping hook and the flail belong to the past. They are looked upon as curiosities by this generation. The sturdy arms and vigorous bodies which used them have joined the great majority, but everywhere we see the results of their labors and their industry, their energy and their integrity, are a heritage to be appreciated and an example that should be imitated by their more favored descendants.—Hake is still caught on the south side when weather permits, and bait can be had. Squid are taking the hook better than at the first of the season which may solve the bait problem or the rest of the fishing period. Some mackerel have been caught on the North Side, but there is nothing compared with last-summer's times when the whole Gulf swarmed with them. Before the storms, the principal body was five or six miles north of East Point with a few stragglers scattered as far west as Campbell's Cove, and any boat large enough to venture out the distance, and close enough to the Point to reach the body would get a few hundred, while the smaller boats and dories had to be contented with few stray ones picked up in closer proximity to the shore and to their fishing stands. Some three or four vessels only are engaged in the business this year, a remnant of the hundreds that once made money in these waters before the days of the purse seine.
