SIR FREDERICK BORDEN AND REV. DR. PRINGLE.

When Rev. Dr. Pringle characterized Sir Frederick Borden in the Presbyterian General Assembly in terms of opprobrium which were distinctly livelious, and challenged the accused to bring an action in court to test the truthfulness of the charges. The Guardian expressed the opinion that the challenge so made ought to be taken up. A number of Liberal newspapers have had the independence to speak out in similar or stronger fashion. The Sackville Tribune is one of these and strongly intimated that Sir Frederick must institute proceedings against Rev. Dr. Pringle. The Amherst News, also a Liberal paper, says: "Sir Frederick Borden must face his accusers at the earliest possible date. Dr. Pringle's statements before the General Assembly of the Presbyterian Church cannot be overlooked." The Eastern Chronicle of New Glasgow, which has been a staunch Liberal journal for a generation past, speaks with even stronger emphasis as follows. "Regarding Dr. Pringle's accusations against the Minister of Militia they may be at false as hell; but we don't know and therefore have nothing particular to say to the reverend muckraker on the subject. However, the Minister should clear himself of the charge or resign his seat in the Government. We confess that he was not ready to meet his accusers in the Supreme Court at Kentville. That looked bad. His accusers were there, they declared, with the evidence to convict the Minister on a very serious charge; but he dodged the issue at that time and put it off to a more convenient season. That action did not give his Liberal friends confidence in his innocence of the charge made against him. Until he meets and refutes the charge made against him, in Kentville, and its renewal by Rev. Dr. Pringle, the Minister cannot expect Liberals to defend him."

A NEW EXPERIMENT IN LOCAL OPTION.

The Legislature of Iowa at its recent session adopted a liquor law with novel features. It is the reverse of the local option law which prevails in Ontario, for instance. In Ontario the Province is under a license law and the cities and municipalities are given power by a three-fifths vote to withhold licenses and close all the saloons and bars. In Iowa the state is placed under prohibition and the cities and municipalities are empowered to vote themselves "wet" if they so desire. For instance, any city with more than 5,000 inhabitants or any county upon a Petition of Consent signed by 65 per cent of the electors, may vote itself free from the prohibitory law and bring in a system of restricted license. The saloon must be of one room only, with but one door, and that opening on a business street. No blinds are allowed and no furniture. No women may be employed about the premises. But even when a city or county has voted itself out from under the general prohibitory law of the State, a saloon can only be opened on petition of the adjacent property owners. A saloon must not be within a specified distance of a church or a school house. And if a community, having brought back the saloon wishes afterwards to get rid of it, the Petition of Consent can be withdrawn by popular vote and the prohibition penalties will again come into force. The law is, of course, a compromise, but it is claimed to be an improvement on the local option laws of the Canadian Provinces, inasmuch as it throws the burden of labor and expense upon those who favor the saloons. There may be something in that, but any law which tolerates or provides for the licensed saloon under any conditions must come far short of being an adequate remedy for the evils of the liquor traffic.

THE ELECTION LAW MUST BE AMENDED.

There are evidences that the popular conscience is being aroused against the present election law. Mr. Crosby, to his credit be it said, has an interesting contest is now on which resulted from a challenge by Col. E. J. Ball of Laramie, Wyoming, on a wager of \$10,000 to produce more standard grade oats on 100 acres of land than can be produced in Canada. A syndicate of Lethbridge, Alberta, farmers has accepted the challenge, so the New York Tribune says. Col. Ball will grow his oats on irrigated lands, while the Canadians undertake to compete without this advantage. The stakes are posted with the National Corn Association. If the facts are as above stated, the Alberta farmers have taken a great risk. Irrigated lands usually produce much larger yields than can be had from "dry farming." And Col. Ball claims to have now a record of 137 bushels of oats to the acre.

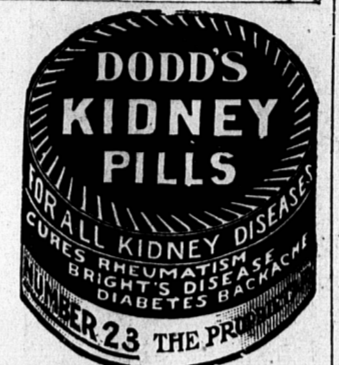
