Playing inspired football before one of the largest crowds of the season West Kent's flashy and of rugby warriors provided an upset in Saturday's football card by blanketing King's Collegiate fifteen 8-0 in a return exhibition match at the Victoria Park. The local school team lost the game at Windsor, Thanksgiving, 8-3. Two tries and a convert gave the West Kenters victory.

The first try came early in the second half after a sustained offensive when, following a scrum, made P. Sinclair, rangy forward, slipped a pass to H. Matheson, who plunged over the line on the far corner of the field. Doug Saunders, who incidentally was playing opposite his brother Jack on the half-back line, converted in a beautiful kick from a difficult angle. Lloyd Archer, speedy and rugged wingman, climaxed the scoring efforts of the blue and yellow by racing 70 yards to lay the pigskin between the posts after gathering in a pass from McEachern. Saunders failed to convert.

It was only the deadly tackling of King's backfield, led by Jack Saunders, Bob DeBlols and P. Karas, that kept the score from mounting against them. The King's rearguard worked overtime as West Kent, controlling the ball, sent it to a smooth-working backfield which ripped gaping holes in the opposition ranks. Jack and Doug Saunders waged a kicking duel all their own which led to gains for both sides while the opposing fullbacks, Harding and Smith, did some timely relieving with their teams hard pressed. Smith of the Kingsmen insinuated several fine broken field runs when hounded by a pack of zealous re-living yellow and blue jerseys forward.

The Kingsmen appeared off color and it was only on occasions that their speedy backfield blasted form being kept on the defensive by a dogged, determined W. K. S. team. In the first half both teams played cautiously with the Kingsmen carrying the play. Near the close the local school team "warmed up" to the play and led by Archer and McEachern launched several offensives that were halted only by the persistent tackling of the King's backfield.

As the second half opened both sides engaged in a kicking duel. The K. C. S. squad mainly carried the play into foreign territory forcing the W. K. S. to touch for safety. Following a series of kicks Matheson plunged over for the opening try after Pete Sinclair had engineered the play from the visitors' 40 yard line.

Sensing defeat the K. C. S. fought their way to their opponents' 30 yard mark only to have the speedy Archer take a pass from McEachern and race 70 yards for his team's second try.

## Conacher and Schriener Star In Tie Game

**TORONTO, Nov. 10**—Paced by sniping Sweeney Schriener, last year's outstanding rookie, New York Americans held Toronto Maple Leafs to a 5-5 overtime tie in the opening game of the National Hockey League local season and gave clear indication they are potential playoff timber.

Schriener scored four goals Saturday night, the last giving the New York machine Red Dutton his rebuilt tie a minute and 41 seconds from the end of overtime and the second game of the National Hockey League local season and gave clear indication they are potential playoff timber.

## Maritime Class A Hockey Passes Into History; Saint John Club Disbands

**SAINT JOHN, N. B., Nov. 10**—The Maritime Hockey League, circuit of Allan Cup champions for the last three years, was dead tonight. Tottering since Halifax Wolverines withdrew last week, the League met its death blow during the week-end when officials of the Saint John Beavers decided that they, too, would be unable to continue in class "A" hockey.

The Beavers' break-up began Friday when Walter Brenneman left to play with London Tecumsehs in the International League. His mates on the crack "kid" line, Joffre Deslets and Ray Gettiffe, entrained last night to join him in London.

Announcement also was made of plans to reorganize the Southern New Brunswick Hockey League, dormant for the last three seasons. This will include a newcomer, St. Andrews, as well as clubs from the former member centres—Saint John, Fredericton and Sussex.

Reorganization of the Beavers for the Southern New Brunswick League probably will leave very few of the old players in the new line-up. They were told to accept any offer they liked.

Len Burrage, a former Moncton Hawk who came here last season when the Hawks disbanded, said "Then the Hawks disbanded, I went to Pittsburgh and was negotiating to see if four team-mates—Walter Monson, Crossley Sherwood, Monty Muckle and Jerry McCabe—could secure positions with the same club.

Some of the Beavers who remain may be distributed among the revived league to balance the competition. Officials said they were through with the policy of importing players.

## Abbies Lone Survivors Of League

Post mortems over the Maritime Hockey League were held last night as Abegweit officials expressed the keen regret over the passing of the league which produced three Allan Cup championship teams in the last three years.

"Charlottetown Abegweits were the first to form the League and are the last to drop out," commented Dr. I. J. Yeo, one of the directors of the club.

"Charlottetown has always been a great hockey town and fans haven't forgotten the stirring contests between Summerside and Charlottetown. However the abdication of Summerside from the Island League marked the entry of 'big time' hockey in this Island Province.

"Formation of the 'Big Six' embracing Moncton, Bathurst, Dalhousie, Campbellton, Fredericton and Charlottetown was the first step in this direction. Financial troubles forced three teams out after a year's operation and a league with Moncton, Halifax and Charlottetown was known as the 'Big Three.' These teams carried on for two years and then St. John were admitted to make up the 'Big Four.' This loop had a two year run and it is safe to say that during this period Maritime Province fans witnessed the finest brand of amateur hockey played in the world.

### Wanderers Defeat Tigers
