**FROM OVERSEAS**—Corp. J. T. Mullin, of Kensington, who enlisted in the 6th Field Co., Canadian Engineers, in Vancouver, B. C., in September 1914, was in the city yesterday in connection with receiving his discharge. Corp. Mullin was over two years in France and saw considerable fighting. He was wounded in the leg in the last fight at Cambrai, a month before the armistice was signed. Before going overseas he was for sixteen years located in Vancouver, but has now decided to remain on the Island.

**FIGHTING P.E.I. FAMILY**—Lieut. George C. Walker leaves today for his home in Charlottetown after spending a few days in this city with his aunt, Mrs. D.R. Chandler. Lieut. Walker had four years' service in France with the second heavy siege battery. He was wounded twice and won distinction for gallantry. His brother, Lieut. Bert Walker, was killed at Hill 70, and another brother, Lieut. Austin Walker, was also killed two weeks later. The father of these boys, Capt. James Walker, is still in France, where he has been ever since the war broke out, being one of the first of the Canadians to get to the front. He is now senior quartermaster of the Canadian in France. Capt. Walker, who is a brother of Mrs. D.R. Chandler, does not expect to arrive home before the middle of the summer.—Moncton Times.

### Prize Money For Men Of British Fleet

OTTAWA, March 18.—A Royal proclamation dealing with the distribution of prize money to the fleet has been received by the Naval Service here. In this distribution members of the Canadian Navy who performed service at sea are included on exactly the same basis as those of the British Navy.

The proclamation defines the nature of the service to be having been on service at sea on the books of a British ship or on the books of a private ship for service in armed sailing vessels.

Offensively armed auxiliary vessels serving with the fleet are classed as ships of war, as are also crewed by British, armed boarding vessels and ships of the auxiliary fleet.

Prize money is awarded to the crews of naval ships of the Royal Naval Air Service, and others who have had to be continuously at sea while borne on the books of a British ship are also entitled to their proportion of the prize money, but no service on shore with the army or in training is counted.

The proclamation provides for the method by which the money shall be divided. The Commander-in-Chief of the Grand Fleet receives 1,000 shares, a squadron commander receives 750 shares, and it is graded down until the lowest man is given five shares, and the ship's boy three.
