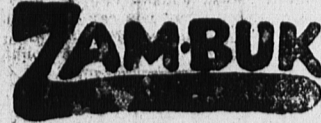

THE SUGAR SITUATION.—The sugar situation in Canada has undergone little or no change since our last report says the Halifax Maritime Merchant. The Atlantic Refinery reduced its price 10 cents a hundred, but we have not yet been able to see that it was warranted, though we are bound to confess it served a certain purpose, namely, to make the public less keen on obtaining supplies. As lessened a psychological effort the decline was excellent, but as an indication of the condition of prospective supplies and prices we cannot recommend it so highly, for as a matter of fact all the refineries are now considerably exercised as to when and how new supplies will be obtained; they are still waiting on the International Sugar Commission and in the meantime there are rumors that the Demerara crop has been largely bought up by English refiners, so it may be that Canada may eventually find herself dependent on Cuba for next spring's raws, a prospect which gives very little satisfaction to the man needing stock for his refinery at the present time. In the United States the situation is if anything more bullish than it was two weeks ago. The Louisiana cane crop is short and the western beet crop slower than usual coming in.

ISLAND PRODUCE.—The Maritime Merchant Halifax says: We are told that the Island shippers are rather inactive just now; that American and Western buyers have given the farmers such exaggerated idea of values that the shippers prefer to let the farmers keep their potatoes for the time being. Besides, vessels are hard to secure and with the railway embargo now effective, except for shipments in heated cars, it is difficult to get potatoes forward. The Island shippers so we are told, seem to think that prices will drop. Of course the farmer, in view of the good price their produce and feed to their live stock. But it would seem that there is a large surplus of potatoes on the Island. Very little is doing locally, some small sales being made of stock that has been here for some time, the price being \$2.00 to \$2.15 per 90 lb. bag. There have been very few Island oats on this market this season. The market is sky high, there is a great scarcity of Island oats, and the situation is strengthened by the short supply and high price of western oats. Island shippers say they have no oats to offer.

JAPAN'S SPHERE OF ACTIVITY IS THE ORIENT

Charges That Nation is Luke-warm to the Allies is Answered.

SPEAKER SAYS JAPS WILL NOT QUIT CAUSE.

Japan Has No Desire to Interfere in Occidental Affairs.

NEW YORK, Nov. 15.—An answer to charges that Japan is luke-warm to the Allied cause because its armies are not fighting on European battlefields, which he said appear occasionally in the American press, was made before the Rotary Club here today by Dr. T. Jeynaga, director of the East and West News Bureau.

He declared that Japan is understood in Europe and is carrying out fully its part as originally agreed upon, and that it had not been seen fit by the Allies to suggest any change in that plan.

No Request for Soldiers.

"It was the wish neither of her Allies nor Japan that we enter the European war stage and there has been no formal request for Japan to send an expedition force to Europe," he said.

"The reason is not far to seek. Japan's proper sphere of activity is in the Orient and the Pacific. For this reason when she entered the war in obedience to the Anglo-Japanese alliance Japan, by an agreement with her ally, limited her naval and military activities to the Far East and its waters."

"The sphere of her naval operations, however, has been gradually extended, first to the south seas, then to the Indian Ocean, thence to the waters of the Cape of Good Hope, and to embrace the Pacific and finally to the Mediterranean, where a fleet of Japanese destroyers is today co-operating with Allied fleets against enemy submarines."

Leader in Orient.

"It has been well and truthfully said that, just as the United States contented so must Japan sound the dominant note in the East. Japan should, therefore, use its vast influence in the Orient, and in the Occident let the United States on one side of the Atlantic and democratic countries of Europe on the other take the lead."

"So far as purely military operations are concerned it seems but proper that the war in the Occident would be entirely out of harmony with the wise and far-sighted policy that must guide Japan, for in pursuing another course she would be bound to face the dilemma either of losing her hardwon military prestige or of reawakening the cry of 'yellow peril,' which is now fortunately on the point of being committed to oblivion."

Ready to Risk All.

"The world on the other hand, be a

mark of discourtesy on the part of Japan to think of sending her troops to the assistance of her European Allies. Those who advocate the easy fashion the 'despatch' of Japanese forces to Russia to rehabilitate the morale of the Russian troops ignore the psychology of the Russian people.

He added there were also almost insurmountable physical and financial difficulties in the way of sending Japanese forces to Europe. There are many better ways for Japan to serve the Allied cause, he said, and "under no circumstances or emergencies will Japan fail in her imperative duty to risk all sacrifices all at the altar of the common cause."

IN MEMORIAM

THE LATE EDWARD CULLEN.

There passed to his eternal reward at the Marine Hospital, Staten Island, N. Y., Edward Cullen, eldest son of the late John Cullen, Alexandria, Lot 49, at the age of 53. Mate of the heart as the result of a ship wreck off the Irish coast in Nov. 1916 and has since been in the Hospital at Halifax N. S., and Chelsea Mass. in June last at the wish of the company for which he had sailed for years he entered the Snug Harbor Hospital for treatment, and after almost gained his normal health. He had followed the sea for more than thirty years, he visited many strange countries and saw many historic places of which he took only a passing interest, being of a quiet disposition, he seldom went ashore only on Sunday to attend Mass in the Catholic Church of which he was a devoted member, and whose clergy visited him week by week until his death while in New York he was constantly visited by his brothers T. A. of Brooklyn N. Y. and Capt. F. E. Masterson of Me. S. S. Wellington. He (E. C.) stayed two months with his brother and finding him sufficiently revived to leave for home at any time on Oct. 18th sailed on his ship for Genoa, Italy. On the day previous to his death his sister Mrs. Jackman received a letter from him telling her since Fred had sailed he was growing lonesome and would leave for home in the course of a week or

so. With his brother he had made all preparations to leave on Nov. 8th but on Tuesday Oct. 30th having breakfasted he went to his room to marking that he would take a walk in the grounds, and while putting on his overcoat he sank across his bed, and the soul of poor Mate Cullen took passage on that voyage from which there is no return. On Nov. 1st they laid to rest all that was mortal of a brave seaman and a kind and thoughtful son and brother. He leaves to mourn his sorrowing mother, and three brothers T. A. Cullen, Brooklyn N. Y., Capt. Fred, Genoa, Italy, and James at home also three sisters Mrs. Peace and Mrs. O'Neil, Lynn, Mass. and Mrs. Wm. Jackman, Village Green, Lot. 49.

May his soul rest in peace.

ADJUSTABLE SUPPORT FOR BROKEN LIMBS

Tests of a new limb support which have been made in a hospital in this country have proved so satisfactory that a Red Cross unit will take one of the devices to France, together with specifications or making others if desired. As illustrated and described in the December Popular Mechanics Magazine, it consists of a hammocklike sling suspended from a steel arm that can be attached either to a bed or a wheel chair. Its special feature is the freedom of movement that it affords the patient. By means of a rope and pulleys the sling can be raised or lowered, while the supporting arm permits it to swing from side to side.
