DISPOSING OF FOX PELTS

Sir,—Having recently visited New York and other American cities relative to the sale of fox pelts, I learned first that the best time to sell them there is in September, October and November, which means that we must carry our pelts over from January before we get any returns, as well as run the risk from fire and moth. Up to the present there is no far concern in the United States having money to buy our pelts and carry them over. I understand that during the present month there is being formed in New York a company with a million dollar capital for the purpose of buying when pelts come in from the trappers and compete in this particular with London; but I do not imagine it will be organized in time to take care of our pelts from foxes killed this and next month, so that there is only one of two courses open to our breeders, to hold over their pelts till next fall or ship them to London. The unprecedented demand for silver black fox pelts in New York and other American cities during the months of September, October and November, as it is believed, disposed of about every pelt carried over from last year, not only in the United States, but in Canada as well. These pelts have been made up into muffs and stoles and are now being worn by the rich possessors of them, and should be a big advertisement for us. It is the opinion of Alfred Fraser, partner and manager in the New York branch of the C. M. Lamson Company, London, that the best immediate market for our pelts is in London, shipped there direct in March, and sale, and gives as his reason: first, that no pelts will come in from the trappers in time for this sale; second, that there are no silver black fox pelts anywhere to compete with those to be killed in this province, and that this will not be so at their March, June and October sales, as our would then have to compete with trappers' pelts from the wilds being captured in December, January and February.

From all information I could gather in New York and Boston, I strongly advise those who have pelts to dispose of to ship as soon after January 1st as possible to Lamson's so that they may reach London to be sold by them at their usual January sale, 27th of that month. I believe that those this year who have any inferior foxes in silvers will profit by calling and keeping only the best. Until the war is over (at least) keeping poor patches and red foxes is certainly a waste of time and food. Lamson's, as many of your readers know, is the company to whom Dalton Oulton, Gordon, Tuplin and others shipped pelts previous to 1910. They are a most reliable firm. They pay no commission to anyone for soliciting business, and their only charge is six per cent. for selling.
