PRESBYTERY MEET AT MT. STEWARD

AT Mount Stewart, and within the Presbyterian Church there, on Wednesday, July 26th, and at eleven o'clock a. m. which place and date the Presbytery of Prince Edward Island met in consequence of a postcard transmitted to the Moderator and Clerk and was constituted with prayer. Sederant: W. H. Spencer, Moderator, J. W. McKenzie and A. Craise, ministers. It was moved, seconded and unanimously agreed that the Presbytery approve of the action of the moderator and clerk in calling the meeting to consider the urgent business specified.

The Revs. Dr. F. J. Coffin, R. L. Coffin, and A. B. McLeod, being present were invited to sit and correspond.

Elders' commissions were received from the following sessions:—St. James, Charlottetown, Cardian and Mount Stewart, in favour of T. O. James James Harris and Angus McPherson respectively and their names were ordered to be placed on the roll of Presbytery.

Mr. McKenzie reported that he moderated in a call at Bay Fortune on Monday, the 23rd day of July instant that the call came out unanimously in favor of Mr. A. B. McLeod, that it was signed by 74 members and 165 adherents, and accompanied by a guarantee of \$800 stipend with use of manse. On motion the conduct of the interim moderator was approved, and the call sustained as a regular Gospel call.

C. H. S. Sterns, commissioner from the congregation of Souris and Bay Fortune, was heard in support of the call. Mr. The call was then placed in the hands of McLeod and accepted by him. The induction was appointed to take place at Bay Fortune on Wednesday, the 15th day of August next at 2.30 o'clock p. m., the moderator of Presbytery to preside and induct, Mr. M. N. McLeod to preach, Mr. J. W. McKenzie to address the minister, and Mr. E. Smith to address the people. Serving of the edict was left in the hands of the interim moderator. The meeting was closed with the benediction.
