Trout Roe Saved From Winter Hazards At Keppoch Hatchery

(Canadian Press) The fish that get away are the real heroes, claims Mr. Frank Hayley, superintendent of a fish hatchery at Keppoch, one mile from Charlottetown, who has handled them for the past 25 years. Every fall, in the streams of this province, hundreds of trout are trapped or caught by fly. After being stripped of their roe, they are released without all effects, to the mercy of rod and reel enthusiasts. The trout finds a home in the hatchery, safe against winter hazards. The trout eggs, eight inches of fresh water continually passing over them, are placed in trays which are kept scrupulously clean. Normally the fall appears first, soon the rest of the fish appears, a huge bag attached to its side, the bag furthest from the hatchery from two to four weeks. From this stage on the young are fed liver about six times daily until ready to be returned to lakes and rivers. Trapping of the fish is done by v-shaped traps placed across narrow streams, a chute with a small hole at one end allowing the fish to enter into the wire netted box. Mr. Hayley has had wide experience in all stages of hatchery work, starting as a boy and following the footsteps of his father who first took charge of the hatchery on Prince Edward Island.

No Legal Claims

There are no (legal) rights or claims of the class with respect to which the province might request that certain questions should be referred to either the Supreme Court of Canada by the Dominion Government, or to the judicial committee of the Privy Council (Imperial) by the Dominion Government, for their advice, but I do not recommend that such reference be requested.

Mr. Teed's opinion is divided into two sections, one dealing with legal claims under consideration, the other with moral claims. He maintains that the governing factor in legal questions is the British North America Act and kindred statutes and that resolutions passed, including the London resolutions, have no effect legally save insofar as they may be relied on to explain ambiguity in the statutes. At the same time, Mr. Teed gives statements and resolutions made prior to and during negotiations as grounds for recognition of moral or equitable claims. In this connection his main findings and recommendations are, briefly, as follows: That in the matter of subsidies some system of payment of fixed percentage to the provinces of the Dominion, from the Dominion, from customs and excise would be more equitable than the present system of an amount fixed on a per capita basis.

Robbery Case Tried in Summerside. Summerside, Dec. 20 - The case of Jos. McDougall one of the three you men implicated in the robbery of a safe containing \$145 in cash from Alban Arsenault's store on Sunday morning also the theft of two foxes from a ranch in St. Eustace, came before Magistrate E. H. Strong yesterday morning and occupied the court until after 4 o'clock. Mr. W. Henry Noonan acted for the Attorney General. The prisoner had no counsel.

The first witness called was Charles Arsenault who told how he and Jos. McDougall went on Saturday night to about nine o'clock to a ranch at St. Eustace and stole the two foxes. They took them to a barn near the residence of Walter Gallant and put them in a box on Sunday morning along with Walter Gallant to Alban Arsenault's store. He wanted a rifle and the other by means of a brace and bit made a hole in the wall and put the rifle arm through and the Yale lock. He then helped them over the counter with the safe. They had a half a potato bag full of cartridges and tobacco. They took the rifle and the safe out of the store and opened it by means of a heavy axe. They had first taken a light axe but finding that not strong enough one of them went back for another one. They broke open the safe and took out the money. They then went back to W. Gallant's apartment in the Dunn building and divided the money. His father, Arsenault, told the hole in the wall and the hole in the Dunn building and searched for the night.

Other witnesses were Alban Arsenault, the store keeper who identified the rifle as his. His father, Arsenault, and P. W. Perry who identified some of the money. The case was adjourned until this morning at 9 a. m. when further evidence will be taken.

Most of the goods and money have been found and returned. The foxes were identified by their markings and were valued at \$100.00. The cigarette case was valued at between \$15 and \$20.
