THE RANGOON TRAINING WALL.

Sanction has at last been obtained from the Indian Government, says an English exchange, for the construction of the training wall for the Rangoon river which has been under consideration for some years. It is in fact nearly six years since the first report on the scheme was drawn up by the Rangoon Port Trust. The permission is for the expenditure of 125 lakhs of rupees, over £835,000, but it has been arranged that an amended estimate shall be submitted when actual prices for the various items of the works have been ascertained. The reason for this procedure is the lack of local experience in this class of work, which has prevented reliable data being obtained on which to base the estimates. The chairman of the Port Trust points out two only of the difficulties to be encountered in preparing the estimate before any work has been executed. The foundation of the new wall would probably consist of fascine mattresses built on shore, launched, towed to the spot, loaded with stones, and sunk at slack water. The mattresses would be 125ft. long by 90 ft broad, and would contain some 14,000 bundles of brushwood, and in all some four millions of bundles of brushwood would be required. No similar work has ever been done in Burma, and the price of brushwood and cost of labor in making and sinking mattresses could only be ascertained by actual experiments. The establishment of quarries on Kalogouk Island, 123 miles from the work, and the transport of stones in hoppers, will be a novel feature, and until the quarries are actually working it would be difficult to say exactly how much per ton the stone would cost, and when it runs into millions of tons a very small error one way or the other would make a difference in the total.

INDEPENDENT ORDER OF FORESTERS!

REMARKABLE GROWTH!

The Toronto Globe of recent date had something to say about the Independent Order of Foresters, which will interest many besides members. The remarks of the contemporary will bear reproduction:—"Those who may have no personal interest in the Order, but who watch the signs of the times, must have been gratified by the annual reports of the Independent Order of Foresters, whose High Courts for Ontario have just been in session. When it is remembered that these Courts represent a membership of more than 50,000 in Ontario their importance will be appreciated. That this first year under the increased rates shows only a slight decrease in membership, and that now the unsettlement of affairs which prevailed a year ago has evidently given place to unanimity and enthusiasm, are facts of grateful significance to all who are concerned for Canadian institutions. It would have been a public calamity had the change of leadership and the increase of rates resulted in stagnation and weakness. A year ago The Globe commenced the courageous course taken by the new Supreme Chief Ranger in insisting on a rate that would be adequate to the needs of the Order and equitable to all classes of members. We now congratulate him on the year's success. An institution with such a membership and handling a fund of over \$14,000,000 can neither live to itself nor die to itself. From official figures we note that Peel County Ontario, added 408 new members during the past four months, and the actual total of new members for the past three months of June, July, and August, generally regarded as dull months in the Fraternal and Insurance world, reached 4954. June 1830, July 1510, August 1614. The growth in the larger jurisdictions for each month of these three average for Central Ontario, 209; Quebec, 201; Central New York, 132; Southern California, 115. With these figures before us, we cordially agree with the words of the Globe:—"Supreme Chief Ranger Stevenson is making his total a success." The courts in P. E. Island made little growth during 1908. But with these inspiring examples of communities who certainly know what they are about, and by their acts show a firm belief in the present condition of the Order, it is to be expected that the High Court and subordinate Courts of P. E. Island will make a strong rally during the ensuing year, and gather in a harvest of new members.
