MARITIME FIELD PRODUCTS AND VALUES.

A bulletin just issued in the Census and Statistics Monthly from the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, purports to give the quantities and values of the field products for the past year in each of the Provinces of the Dominion. In this bulletin the values of field products in the Maritime Provinces is given as follows:

Table with 2 columns: Province, Value. Nova Scotia: \$14,297,900; New Brunswick: 16,797,000; P. E. Island: 8,846,700.

On its face this is no bad showing for our Garden Province. With but little more than one-fourth as much population as New Brunswick, we produce more than one-half as much value in our fields. With less than one-fifth of as many people as Nova Scotia, we produce four-sevenths as much value in our fields. Surely that is nothing to be ashamed of. But this is only a part of the story.

A brief examination of the tables brings to light some other interesting features. For instance, Prince Edward Island produced more wheat than both the sister Provinces together, and better wheat, if judged by its weight—59.37 lbs. per bushel, as compared with 58 for Nova Scotia—and yet the value is set down at 99 cents for Island wheat and \$1.10 for N. S. wheat.

The same contrast in values runs through the entire table. Our oats are quoted at 43.2 cents, as against 52.9 cents for Nova Scotia oats, while our potatoes are set down at 36 cents and our turnips at 21 cents, as against 50 cents and 23 cents respectively for the like products from Nova Scotia. And in hay and clover the Nova Scotia product is priced \$1.09 per ton higher than the Island hay and clover. This matter of value has a very important bearing upon the case as will appear if we

Nova Scotia values are applied to the quantities of field products in this Province. Going over the quantities and values we find that if our products were given the same price per bushel or per ton as are set down for Nova Scotia the total value of our field products for last year instead of being \$8,846,700, as given in the bulletin, would amount to \$10,941,000, or a gain of over two millions of dollars. We have made comparisons only with Nova Scotia, but the prices set down for New Brunswick field products are about the same, being in some articles higher and in others a little lower than in the peninsular Province.

We beg to direct the attention of our representatives in Parliament and of all who are promoting our claims for better transportation to this important matter. Why is it that a given quantity of field products in Prince Edward Island is worth 20 per cent less than a like quantity of like products, no better in quality, if so good, in the Province of Nova Scotia? Obviously the reason lies in the cost, difficulty and delay of transportation from this Province to the markets in which our produce is sold. A tax of 25 per cent on the value of all that our farmers produce in their fields! Two million dollars of yearly loss because we have been thus hampered in transportation! And this on field products alone.

Surely it is high time that we had the Car Ferry. And it is also time that Parliament should know that at a fair valuation the yearly produce of the fields in this fertile Garden of the Gulf is very close upon eleven million dollars a year, instead of the less than nine millions with which we are officially credited.

PARCELS POST.

We regard it as of prime importance that the House of Commons the other day by an almost unanimous vote adopted a resolution, moved by W. F. McLean, M.P., and calling for the extension and expansion of the parcels post in the public interest. It is to be hoped and believed that the Government of the day will act upon the will of the people and of Parliament as thus expressed, and that without any unnecessary delay. True, parcels of limited size and weight may now be carried through the mails, but the rate of 16 cents a pound is almost prohibitory for parcels of any considerable weight and is far beyond the actual cost of

marriage in most cases. The Government has ready to hand all the means and appliances for the extension of the system as asked for. It has the cars and the contracts with the railway companies. It has the post offices throughout the country and the postmasters in charge of the same. And with the extension of rural delivery it will acquire all the facilities for bringing the blessings of the parcels post to the farmer and settler. We regard the announcement of an intended extension of parcels post as one of the most important that has been made in this country for many a day.

What has hindered and so far prevented this reform in both Canada and the States has been the influence and control which the express companies here and there have had over our own Parliament and over the American Congress. It will be a great boon to the many to be emancipated from the express monopolies to the extent that the parcels post in England and European countries has liberated the people there. The resolution so heartily adopted in Parliament gives reason to hope that the control of the express companies is less absolute than it has been in Canada heretofore, and that the Government may grant an extension of postal facilities for the transmission of parcels that will amount to something worth while.

NOTES

The Sun is coming back from the south. We have now ten hours of sunshine in the day, and the days are rapidly lengthening.

Recent articles in this journal or the past question have attracted attention as far west as Montreal, from which city we have inquiries as to the extent of the peat bogs in the Province, whether they have been surveyed and tested, whether conveniently situated for shipping, &c. It has been found that peat is not only useful as fuel, but that it can be converted into gas in suitable engines and so used for the production of electrical energy. Thus the subject grows in importance and interest.

The New York Evening Post is an ably conducted independent journal whose leanings are perhaps rather to the Republican side. In a recent issue the Post refers to the possible candidates for the presidency, enumerating ten Democrats and five Republicans, adding this comment: "Of the ten Democrats enumerated, eight measure up at least to the average standard of Presidential material, and six or seven could be nominated with some chance of winning. On the Republican side three names only satisfy the latter condition." This would indicate a favorable chance

for the Democrats in the coming Presidential contest.

OBITUARY.

The death of George Rodd took place at an early hour on Friday morning, Jan. 19th, at his late residence, North Milton, after a lingering illness which he bore with true patience. Deceased was born at Charlottetown in 1837 and hardly ever had a day's sickness until his last illness which resulted in his death. He went to the Californian gold fields in 1856 being then only twenty years of age where he stayed for three years being quite successful. He returned and bought the farm on which he resided at the time of his death and where through perseverance and hard work he accumulated a goodly amount of property. He was a man who was much respected and was always known as an honest, upright man, one whose word was as good as his deed. He was married in 1864 to Rebecca Beer of Bannockburn who survives him together with the following four sons and two daughters, viz:—Mrs. Chas. Holman of Strassburg, Sask.; Mrs. John McKinley of North River, P. E. I.; Bruce, Anson, Edmond and Ira who are all settled near and on the old homestead.
